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

LIVE-STREAMING NOTICE

The 9.30am Mass from Sacred Heart Cathedral is livestreamed (and recorded) each week. The camera is located under the choir loft and faces towards the sanctuary, though it can be directed to various parts of the Cathedral if needed.

Parishioners should be aware that they may be filmed during the celebration of the 9.30am Mass. This filming will mostly capture their image from behind. We cannot guarantee, however, that their faces will not be featured on the live-stream or recording, particularly the case during the Communion Procession. The live-stream will make use of multiple camera angles to minimise the identification of individuals as much as possible, but this will not eliminate the possibility of being filmed.

Parishioners with concerns about being filmed or recorded should speak with the Cathedral's Rector in the first instance.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Cathedral

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 2 square metres per person within the building (with no upper limit).

In the Cathedral, that limit is **221 persons**.

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

Every person must provide their contact details or have them provided by someone else (i.e. a parent for a child, a wife for a husband, etc.).

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival.

NB: It is important that you write your FULL name, and print clearly so that it can be easily read by someone from outside the Parish (if necessary).

A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details. It is also possible to use your mobile phone with either the Service NSW QR Code or the third-party QR Code which are accessible via the posters at the doors.

General Requirements

While in the Cathedral, you must observe physical distancing, refrain from physical acts of devotion, avoid unnecessary contact with other parishioners, and not gather with others unnecessarily.

We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

WITNESS TO THE LIGHT Fr Michael Tate

If I ask you 'Who are you?' and you simply answer with your first name, then I will probably be dissatisfied. I need to start to put you into a web of relationships to

get an idea of who you are.

I might need your family name or some hint as to your place of birth.

So, when people came to see this strange man in the wilderness, living in dire poverty on the margins of society, if he had simply given his name 'John', that would have been woefully inadequate.

This Gospel immediately puts 'John' in relationship with another - that is how we are to understand who he is. This Gospel never calls him John the Baptist. No, he is John the Witness, 'a witness to speak for the Light'. Witness? Witness to what? To the Light.

Many religious traditions use light as a symbol. The sun is the most obvious, and in English, we play on the word at Easter, speaking of the Risen Son. Candles play a prominent part in most religions. They obviously indicate some power which can overcome the darkness, some power which can dispel even the shade of death.

But the opening of this Gospel, and John the Witness, prepare us for the revelation that this darknessdefeating power will turn out to be the 'One Who'. The One who is to come is declared to be 'the Light', the radiant Glory of God embodied for us and come to fulfil Isaiah's prophecy by liberating human beings from the many dark captivities which imprison them. John does not here identify who this 'One' is. Who is it who embodies the Light of Divine Glory?

We know because that Truth was made evident at the Transfiguration. The Body of Jesus Christ radiated a beautiful Divine Light. His body had the translucent glow of Divinity.

Can we become partakers in this Divine Light? The answer is 'Yes, by becoming children of the Light.'

This is wonderfully symbolised in baptism. During the baptism ceremony, a small candle is lit from the great candle lit at Easter, the Paschal Candle which represents Christ the Light of the World overcoming the darkness of death.

This symbolises the sacramental relationship of the newly baptised to Jesus Christ, the Light.

Just as John was who he was by his relationship to the one he called 'the Light', so too our lives should witness to that relationship, and that can be done in many ways.

First, by relating to those on the margins of society. Didn't Our Lord say, 'I was hungry, and you gave me food'. Every time we are generous in our compassion for another we are relating to Jesus Christ.

Second, sharing a meal is the most normal human way of relating. By sharing in the spiritual drink and heavenly bread at Mass, we are brought into a wonderful relationship with Jesus Christ, so wonderful we call it 'Holy Communion'.

These are some of the ways in which we can answer as to who we are by relating to Jesus Christ.

Advent invites us to keep focused on that relationship so that when the 25th of December comes, we relate to it not just as a holiday in the calendar, but as a Holy day which we call 'Christ-mass', Christmas.

On that day we celebrate the coming into human history of a vulnerable baby. We relate to that baby as Jesus the Christ, the Divine Light come into human history, the Light of the World.

CHRISTMAS @ SACRED HEART

The Celebration of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas) is one of the highlights of the Christian year, and for very good reason.

Our celebrations in 2020, however, will look significantly different to what they have in the past because of the continuing presence of COVID-19 in our community. This presence requires the observing of a number of restrictions in the way we celebrate Christmas in the Cathedral, largely concerning the number of persons who will be able to attend.

The schedule of Christmas Masses in the Cathedral for 2020 will be:

Christmas Eve 5pm *

7pm

10pm (Polish)

Christmas Day Midnight *

7.30am 9.30am *

11.30am (Polish)

The Masses marked with an * will be live-streamed so that those unable to attend can join the worshipping assembly in a virtual fashion.

And now, the bad news.

Because of the restrictions on the number of persons who can be in the Cathedral, each of the Christmas Masses (apart from the two Polish language Masses) will need to be 'ticketed', i.e. you will need to register in advance in order to attend.

We regret the need to do this, but believe it is the only way to manage the situation efficiently and with some equity.

Registration will be via the Eventbrite website as this permits both the addition of extra spaces if public health orders change, and will also permit the easier collection of contact details of those attending.

Registration for Christmas Masses is available via the Eventbrite website (www.eventbrite.com.au) and entering the event number 127681140729 into the search function. For those without internet access, please contact Fr Andrew or the Regional Office (49791101) who will assist you.

In terms of registration, there are a few requests that I would make.

 Please do not register to attend more than one Mass, as this will take up spaces that others might access. Please be considerate of your brothers and sisters.

- 2. Please do not register for more people than have confirmed will be attending as this too will take up spaces that others might access.
- 3. If you register, and subsequently determine that you are unable to attend, please let Fr Andrew know so that the space can be offered to another person.
- 4. Please do not assume that you can simply turn up on the evening and be admitted—only those with valid registrations will be permitted to enter the Cathedral. To do otherwise is simply unjust to those who have registered in advance.

One of the advantages of using the Eventbrite website to manage registrations is that the Eventbrite website allows for the creation of a 'waitlist' for each of the Masses so that if a space becomes available those seeking to attend a particular Mass can be contacted automatically.

I realise that the additional requirements necessary to attend Christmas Masses this year are burdensome, and I truly wish we had another option. We don't, however, and so I ask for your patience and cooperation as we seek to celebrate the Incarnation of Jesus Christ.

New Year's Day which is also celebrated by the Church as the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, will be celebrated with Mass at 9.30am.


Please note that the usual celebration of Reconciliation, Adoration and Midday Mass will **not** take place on New Year's Day.


