LIVE-STREAMING NOTICE

The 9.30am Mass from Sacred Heart Cathedral is livestreamed (and recorded) each week. The camera is located under the choir loft and faces towards the sanctuary, though it can be directed to various parts of the Cathedral if needed.

Parishioners should be aware that they may be filmed during the celebration of the 9.30am Mass. This filming will mostly capture their image from behind. We cannot guarantee, however, that their faces will not be featured on the live-stream or recording, particularly the case during the Communion Procession. The live-stream will make use of multiple camera angles to minimise the identification of individuals as much as possible, but this will not eliminate the possibility of being filmed.

Parishioners with concerns about being filmed or recorded should speak with the Cathedral's Rector in the first instance.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Cathedral

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 2 square metres per person within the building (with no upper limit).

In the Cathedral, that limit is **221 persons**.

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

Every person must provide their contact details or have them provided by someone else (i.e. a parent for a child, a wife for a husband, etc.).

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival.

NB: It is important that you write your FULL name, and print clearly so that it can be easily read by someone from outside the Parish (if necessary).

A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details. It is also possible to use your mobile phone with either the Service NSW QR Code or the third-party QR Code which are accessible via the posters at the doors.

General Requirements

While in the Cathedral, you must observe physical distancing, refrain from physical acts of devotion, avoid unnecessary contact with other parishioners, and not gather with others unnecessarily.

We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

The Parish Office will close at 5pm on 24 December and reopen at 9am on 4 January 2021. Phone calls to the Office will be checked regularly during the closure, and emails to the Parish email address will also be monitored.

SPIRIT HOVERING

Franco Zeffirelli was a great film director. In his film 'Jesus of Nazareth', he depicted the Annunciation in this way.

Mary is asleep at night. A gust of wind opens a window. Mary, startled and a little afraid, gets up and prays. As she prays we see her face change and her body bend over. With tears in her eyes, Mary looks up through the window at the moonlit sky and simply says 'Yes'. The swirling wind dies down at once.

That is beautiful imagery, trying to portray this extraordinary creative act in human affairs – in the life of this young woman.

How can one portray it? Zeffirelli takes the Jewish tradition of the Holy Spirit as the Divine Wind. The Hebrew word we translate as Spirit can just as well be translated breath or wind. In fact the old term 'Holy Ghost' is an unfortunate morphing of the English 'Holy Gust'. So Zeffirelli uses the wind to symbolise the presence of the Holy Spirit.

St Luke's account of the Annunciation also draws on the Jewish tradition. Let us listen to the first lines of the Jewish scriptures and then hear how Mary discerned what was happening with her.

'In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

Now the earth was a formless void. There was darkness over the deep, and God's spirit hovered over the water. God said "Let there be light", and there was light.'

What is Mary depicted as hearing in the depths of her soul? It echoes the passage from Genesis:

'The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most High will cover you with its shadow.'

Once again, the Holy Spirit hovers, this time over a young Jewish woman, and the most stupendously creative act in human history will take place. With her consent, God assumes human nature to be gradually enfleshed, embodied in Mary's womb.

How are we to respond to such a gospel? First, as a community.

Have you noticed that when we come together for the celebration of Mass, after the Holy, Holy, Holy the priest prays:

'And so, Father, we bring you these gifts. We ask you

to make them holy by the power of your Spirit.'

As he does so, the priest extends his hands so that they *hover* over the gifts of bread and wine. The symbolism is obvious. It alerts us to the fact that stupendous Divine creativity is about to transform material creation. With the words of consecration, what was simply bread and wine becomes the real presence of Our Risen Lord, Jesus Christ.

And individually, how can we respond to this gospel in our lives?

Mary knew her Jewish scriptures. A naturally bewildered young woman was able to respond to God's will because she understood the imagery and symbolism of the Genesis story.

So, we need to get to know the scriptures more intimately so that we will have the language skills to converse with God. God needs conversation partners in order to enter into human history and change the way things would otherwise pan out.

We need to read the gospels with all their Jewishness so that we can understand when God attempts to speak to our souls.

And during the next few days before Christmas let us be alert. To use Zeffirelli's imagery, if we hear the wind blowing, let us resist the urge to get up and close the window. Let it rattle a bit, however disconcerting.

Since our baptisms, the Divine Wind, the Holy Gust, the Holy Spirit, has been hovering over each of us wanting to do great things. It may be that the time has come for a Marian response: 'Be it done unto me according to your word.'


New Year's Day, which is also celebrated by the Church as the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, will be celebrated with Mass at 9.30am.
