LIVE-STREAMING NOTICE

The 9.30am Mass from Sacred Heart Cathedral is livestreamed (and recorded) each week. The camera is located under the choir loft and faces towards the sanctuary, though it can be directed to various parts of the Cathedral if needed.

Parishioners should be aware that they may be filmed during the celebration of the 9.30am Mass. This filming will mostly capture their image from behind. We cannot guarantee, however, that their faces will not be featured on the live-stream or recording, particularly the case during the Communion Procession. The live-stream will make use of multiple camera angles to minimise the identification of individuals as much as possible, but this will not eliminate the possibility of being filmed.

Parishioners with concerns about being filmed or recorded should speak with the Cathedral's Rector in the first instance.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Cathedral

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated as the <u>lesser</u> of allowing 4 square metres per person within the building, or 300 persons.

In the Cathedral, that limit is 110 persons.

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, except funerals (limit is 100 persons).

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

If a 'discrete' group attends, e.g. a family, a husband and wife, people from the same household etc., only one (adult) member of the group is required to provide their contact details.

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival.

A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details. It is also possible to use your mobile phone with either the Service NSW QR Code or the third-party QR Code which are accessible via the posters at the doors.

General Requirements

The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, refraining from communal singing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

Requirements for Attending Mass

There is presently no need to register in advance to attend Mass. If you wish to attend Mass, you are at liberty to do so, though capacity limits will need to be observed at all Masses.

Entrances to the Cathedral

We will now revert to using the main doors of the Cathedral for both weekend and weekday Masses.

TWO GOSPELS

An inscription has been found dating back to nine years before Jesus of Nazareth was born. It celebrates the birthday of the Emperor Augustus whom it describes as a god and announces that his birth was the beginning of 'gospel' (good news) for the world.

Around the mid 60s, in the midst of a terrible persecution of Christians in Rome, a document was written by St Mark which took aim squarely at this pretension of such Roman Emperors.

It has a title which announces itself: 'Beginning of the "gospel" (good news) about Jesus, Christ, the Son of God.'

St Mark is telling us that a great contest is going to unfold between the emperors of this world and the figure of Jesus. And the superior Gospel will be that of Jesus because he *is* the Christ, he *is* Son of God.

There will be a battle as to who will reign over the world, a battle which will not be won by overwhelming military power but with ... with what, by whom?

Here, St Mark immediately introduces the strange figure of John the Baptist to start to supply the answer. He was a man living in dire poverty scavenging for the honey of wild bees and eating grasshoppers.

He attracted quite a following to the River Jordan where he would immerse his disciples in water. The Greek word for plunging someone into water is 'baptiseo'. So John was called, 'John the Immerser', or 'John the Drencher' = 'John the Baptist'.

But John realised that the baptism he performed was only half the story. It symbolised the washing away of sins. It put the past in the past and prepared his followers for the future, but he could not bring about that future. John knew he did not have the power to effect a completely new future for humanity.

But what if someone came on the scene who *could* inundate people, flood their lives with Divine Power? John's baptism would pale by comparison. This is why John says: 'Someone is following me, someone more powerful than I am ... I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

There is someone who can immerse, dip, drench people in the Holy Spirit, in the dynamic life of God. John does not identify the 'Someone', but we know that the 'Someone' is the One announced in the heading: 'Jesus Christ, Son of God'.

He is the One who will inaugurate the reign of God, and the reign of the Emperor will be superseded. That is *the* Good News. That is *the* Gospel.

There is a superior dynamism at work in human history: the Holy Spirit. Christians have been immersed in that Spirit when they were baptised as the Lord commanded, '... in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The emperors of this world, over the centuries and even today, the emperors of this world: political supremos, social elites, financial overlords, force or brainwash people to do them homage, to bend the knee, like Augustus, to treat them as gods.

But there is a worldwide community with a different allegiance. Sometimes, actually quite often, we need to remember that we are a worldwide community of dissidents: a worldwide community which sees that most emperors have no clothes.

This is the worldwide community baptised into 'the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the *Holy Spirit*.' This Spirit-filled community, the Church at its best, introduces a new dynamic into human history.

That is bad news for most emperors. It is very good news, very good Gospel for the whole world, for the whole of human history.

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

CHRISTMAS @ SACRED HEART

The Celebration of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas) is one of the highlights of the Christian year, and for very good reason.

Our celebrations in 2020, however, will look significantly different to what they have in the past because of the continuing presence of COVID-19 in our community. This presence requires the observing of a number of restrictions in the way we celebrate Christmas in the Cathedral, largely concerning the number of persons who will be able to attend, and the regrettable absence of the singing together of well known carols (at least according to the rules in place when this edition goes to print).

The schedule of Christmas Masses in the Cathedral for 2020 will be:

The Masses marked with an * will be live-streamed so that those unable to attend can join the worshipping assembly in a virtual fashion.

And now, the bad news.

Because of the restrictions on the number of persons who can be in the Cathedral, each of the Christmas Masses (apart from the two Polish language Masses) will need to be 'ticketed', i.e. you will need to register in advance in order to attend.

We regret the need to do this, but believe it is the only way to manage the situation efficiently and with some equity.

Registration will be via the Eventbrite website as this permits both the addition of extra spaces if public health orders change, and will also permit the easier collection of contact details of those attending.

Registration for Christmas Masses is available via the Eventbrite website (www.eventbrite.com.au) and entering the event number 127681140729 into the search function. For those without internet access, please contact Fr Andrew or the Regional Office (49791101) who will assist you.

We are giving our regular parishioners first option on registering. The event will not be placed on the Cathedral website, or our various social media outlets until the beginning of December. In terms of registration, there are a few requests that I would make.

- 1. Please do not register to attend more than one Mass, as this will take up spaces that others might access. Please be considerate of your brothers and sisters.
- 2. Please do not register for more people than have confirmed will be attending as this too will take up spaces that others might access.
- 3. If you register, and subsequently determine that you are unable to attend, please let Fr Andrew know so that the space can be offered to another person.
- 4. Please do not assume that you can simply turn up on the evening and be admitted—only those with valid registrations will be permitted to enter the Cathedral. To do otherwise is simply unjust to those who have registered in advance.

One of the advantages of using the Eventbrite website to manage registrations for our Christmas Masses is that it is easier to increase the number of spaces available should public health orders change to permit this.

The other advantage is that the Eventbrite website allows for the creation of a 'waitlist' for each of the Masses so that if a space becomes available those seeking to attend a particular Mass can be contacted automatically.

I realise that the additional requirements necessary to attend Christmas Masses this year are burdensome, and I truly wish we had another option. We don't, however, and so I ask for your patience and cooperation as we seek to celebrate the Incarnation of Jesus Christ.

Advent

We're on our yearly Advent journey on the road to Christmas. On that road we encounter **John the Baptist**; indeed we can't by-pass him! He is a fiery figure calling us to examine our lives and repent.

The anthesis to the Christmas frenzy of December, John stands in the middle of the road to Christmas **shouting** 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight the paths' '

John calls us to make a U Turn!, to

- open our eyes to the needs of others
- discover the presence of God in our lives
- open our heart to the true beauty of Advent days

This week we hear Mark's Gospel, Chapter 1,'*The beginning of the* **Gospel** of Jesus Christ, the Son of God'.

In the first reading from Isaiah, the author considers Jerusalem to be the 'herald of glad tidings'. As we saw last Sunday, Isaiah is superb in creating powerful images when dealing with the mystery of God in our lives. This Sunday he images 'God's people' gathered in the folds of God's garments - the way a shepherd makes a large pocket out of his outer garment to carry a stray lamb.

This is our vocation as the Church, the new Jerusalem. We are the 'heralds of glad tidings' - we are a **Gospel** to others.

The sobering note of Christmas - in the midst of celebrating the coming of Christ, who came to make us free - are those who 'hate' or 'detest' Christmas.

Perhaps because they have no family to rejoice with. How can we make a difference? We can't escape John the Baptist. As a Church we need to prepare the way of the Lord for all people.

During Advent we have different sights and sounds in our liturgy and worship space.

- Pregnant Mary: Mary is heavily pregnant with anticipation of the birth of Jesus. We journey with her, and allow Mary to fully reveal to us the dignity and potential of our discipleship.
- The Advent Wreath reminds us of the eternity of God and the freshness of His love for us.
- People hang Advent Wreaths on their doors as a sign of welcome, of hospitality. We welcome Christ who comes to our home, that is our Parish Church, in the person of the stranger, the visitor.
- Mark's Gospel with its year-long theme of Who is Jesus.
- The Music of Advent reflects our expectations. It is neither the penitential song of Lent nor the joyful song of Christmas. The sound of the music for Advent attempts to provide a sense of beauty and profound longing and a joy-filled faith that expects fulfilment.
- The Colour for Advent is not the colour of Lent. In Advent the dark blue of the winter sky in Europe is replaced in the southern hemisphere by the colour of the Jacaranda. This is our native colour of Advent.




PARISH OFFICE CHRISTMAS CLOSURE
