**VINNIES WINTER APPEAL
COMING TO A CHURCH NEAR YOU!**

DIVINE ENERGY AND BEING CATHOLIC

As summer progresses in Australia there is a sense of anticipation, of expectation. It is the bushfire season. Millions of eucalypts breathe their oils which hang as a potent haze over the hills. The prevailing conditions are just right. One spark and all that potential energy would be ignited and fire would sweep through with great intensity.

Those who report the infernos not only speak of the flames but often of a mighty roar like a great windstorm heralding the approaching fire.

The state of the world after Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension was much like Australia in summer. There was a great air of expectation. After all, Our Lord had promised that he would send the Holy Spirit.

Death had been conquered and the world was supercharged with divine energy and vitality. And then, with the Divine potency hovering over humanity, into all this the Risen Lord sent his Holy Spirit.

This was like a lightning strike, a flaming spark. Divine energy was unleashed and St Luke portrays this event in our bushfire terms. The Holy Spirit, he says, was 'like tongues of fire' and 'like the sound of a mighty wind'. That was as close as the early church could get to describing the phenomena accompanying the descent of the Holy Spirit on a gathering of a fearful group of followers of Our Lord.

To return to the Australian landscape. There are few things more creative, more necessary than an intense fire to burst open the seedpods in our eucalypt forests. Not only to open them up but to clear away competing undergrowth and to allow new life to germinate in the ashes, to take root and to grow.

This is what happened to the early Christian community (Mary and some women and the main male disciples) at Pentecost.

The tangled undergrowth of fear, anxiety and timidity was cleared away. The new life of the church was germinated, took root and has been growing ever since. It is the birth-day of the church, the Catholic Church, the universal church.

The title 'Catholic' is only appropriate where race, ethnicity, nationality and language do not operate as causes of division or separation.

Pentecost ensures that language is not to be a barrier to people hearing and responding to the message which St Peter went out and boldly preached. Peoples from every part of the world hear the gospel in their own tongue. A new unity was possible for humanity in the core message preached by St Peter.

And that was that Jesus of Nazareth had conquered death and that Peter and others were witnesses to the Risen Lord. This is still the core message and task of the successor of St Peter. Everything else is peripheral. His role is to preach the resurrection in a way which is understandable by people of every culture, every ethnicity, every language group around the world.

The Church, at this beginning of this third millennium, has the opportunity to advance and manifest its worldwide character with greater recognition of the way in which Catholicism expresses itself in Asia and Africa.

But it is also important that we recognise the work of the Holy Spirit at our local and even parish level. We recall the youngsters who received First Holy Communion and Confirmation late last year, and the adults who did so at Easter only a few weeks ago.

They are like seedpods within whom the spiritual potential had been waiting to be ignited. The Holy Spirit has, in various appropriate ways, come into their lives and has begun to open up that depth in their personalities. Please God, it will continue to grow not only for them as individuals but for us as a parish community.

Let us pray for continuous Pentecosts in our midst, and in the universal Church. There is no better way than to do so in the words of the ancient prayer:

*Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful
and enkindle in them the fire of your love.
Send forth your Spirit and they will be created
and you will renew the face of the earth.*

HISTORICAL CONTEXT

Pentecost

The word Pentecost comes from the Greek for fiftieth day. Pentecost Sunday ends the season of Easter and comes as a Sabbath day after seven weeks of seven days. In Jewish tradition the 50th day after the Passover was celebrated as a blessing of the harvest and rather than the unleavened bread of Passover it was celebrated by leavening the bread. It was for this reason that the disciples were gathered together when they experienced the Holy Spirit empowering them. In Christian tradition, Pentecost is celebrated as the arrival of the Spirit, promised by Jesus, that animated the disciples to spread the gospel of Jesus and gather believers to form what would eventually become the Church.

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CONFIRMATION, BALLOONS

& THE HOLY SPIRIT

A REPORT BY ANNE MILLARD

Ninety children were confirmed in Sacred Heart Cathedral last week—45 on Tuesday and 40 on Wednesday. This coming week we will confirm another 35. I ask you to keep the children and their families in your prayers.

These children are pioneers in the Diocese because they received all their training for the Sacraments of Initiation online. Using a platform called Moodle, the children and their families logged on each week to watch a short instructional video about an aspect of the sacraments. They discussed the video as a family and were asked to post responses via a discussion forum.

The online platform ideally embodies the Diocesan directive that the Sacramental journey be family centred, parish based, and school supported. Almost all the videos are homemade featuring individuals from our Parishes. Although a bit cheesy, they have been well received and the children all seem to have learned from them.

The use of video for instruction ensures the learning is easily accessible for the whole family. Our school teachers have been incredibly supportive of the program. We are very blessed to have such incredible schools in our Parish!

A major part of the children's preparation for Confirmation is the Works of Mercy project, whereby the children with support from their families devise and carry out either a Spiritual or Corporal Work of Mercy. The reports are beautiful. Our children are caring, thoughtful, and compassionate.

Because the instruction is all online and we don't physically see the children, we thought it might be fun to mail them a letter. Physical mail is a treat (especially when it's not a bill). So we mailed out the following:

Dear ...

Very soon you will be confirmed, and that's something to celebrate. Enclosed with this letter is a balloon. Balloons often indicate celebrations—I love to have them at parties. The balloon I've sent you is red—the colour of Pentecost. Your confirmation takes place during the same week as Pentecost. We think of Pentecost as the birthday of the church. Another good reason for a balloon!

You can have a lot of fun with a balloon. But there is something lacking in the balloon you've received, isn't there? It needs to be filled with air! Before a balloon can fulfill its purpose, someone must breathe some life into it.

I think this balloon can help us understand the Holy

Spirit. Pentecost is the day that God sent the Holy Spirit to breathe life into the church so it would be all that God intended for it to be.

At the Last Supper, Jesus told his disciples that he would not be with them much longer and promised to send the Holy Spirit to help them. We hear about the arrival of the Holy Spirit in the Acts of the Apostles:

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.

Before God sent His Holy Spirit, the church was lifeless—like the balloon you received. After the Holy Spirit breathed life into the church, people began telling everyone they saw about Jesus. The church as we know it was born! The story of Jesus spread from that day throughout the whole world.

Now it's your turn! Breathe life into your balloon and remember that just as the balloon needs to be filled to be what it was intended to be, you and I need the Holy Spirit to fill us so we can be all that God wants us to be.

Happy ballooning.

To emphasize the metaphor of the balloon, a marvellous team of ten parish volunteers created an impressive swag of 150 red balloons that floated across the nave of the Cathedral. It looked amazing!

The confirmation liturgy began on Tuesday evening with much excitement. The Bishop was just beginning his homily and a balloon popped. The acoustics in the Cathedral are impressive (as a musician I know they are the best in Newcastle). Hence, that popping balloon in the Cathedral was mighty loud. After the laughter and reactions died down, the Bishop tied the moment right back to the violent wind that came from heaven on Pentecost.

There are just so many messages to take from this experience. I thought a balloon pop would be a catastrophe. I imagined people saying, "Remember that woman who worked here until the balloon incident?" But it wasn't a disaster. It was another beautiful piece in the metaphor. We like to have things perfect in our lives, don't we? But one popped balloon doesn't spoil the whole effect.

Sometimes the Holy Spirit is buoyant and makes our balloons fly high. Sometimes they pop. We can't control a balloon, just as we can't control the Holy Spirit. I hope the spirit soars in you this Pentecost.

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING PLANNED GIVING TAX RECEIPTS

Parishioners who require a tax receipt for Planned Giving for the 2020/2021 financial year must notify the Parish Office by 30 June 2021.

Please notify by one of the following methods:

Email to newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au - Use the wording, *"Please provide me with a Planned Giving tax receipt"* and include your name and envelope number.

Phone: Call the Parish Office on 4979 1101.

Tax receipt data will be processed on 30 June 2021 and requests must be made by that date.

No subsequent amendments are possible. Any requests received after 30 June 2021 will result in parishioners not receiving a tax receipt. In turn, they will not be able to claim a tax deduction. If you do not require a tax receipt for tax purposes, it is preferable not to request one, as this will enhance the tax deductibility for those who do use the tax receipt. If you do not submit a tax return (and therefore do not require a tax receipt), we can provide you with written confirmation of your contribution total. You can request this by emailing or by phoning the parish office.

Please note that due to limitations imposed by Section 83C of the NSW Education Act, letters relating to a School Building Levy (DFSBL) reduction can no longer be offered by the Parish.



PLANNED GIVING

We are auditing our planned giving envelopes for the Newcastle parish this year. Please provide us with: Name, Address, Email and phone number, and which church you attend. Please note that Mayfield and Stockton parishes will not be audited this financial year, but perhaps next.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Churches

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 2 square metres per person within the building.

In our Region, those limits are:

Sacred Heart Cathedral	221
St Mary's, Newcastle	108
St Joseph's, The Junction	200
Mary Immaculate, Tighes Hill	110
St Laurence O'Toole, Broadmeadow	110
St Peter-in-Chains, Stockton	140
Christ the King, Mayfield West	140

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, such as weddings and funerals.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival. These details must be recorded for each attendee.

Attendees are able to use the Service NSW QR Code to provide their details—just like many other places—using the Service NSW app on your phone, or via a QR Code reader. A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details.

General Requirements

The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

Liturgical rituals have been adapted, and will continue to be adapted, in order to ensure the health and safety of all parishioners and visitors to our churches. We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

Requirements for Attending Mass

There is no need to register in advance to attend regular Mass. If you wish to return to Mass, you are at liberty to do so, though capacity limits will need to be observed at all Masses.

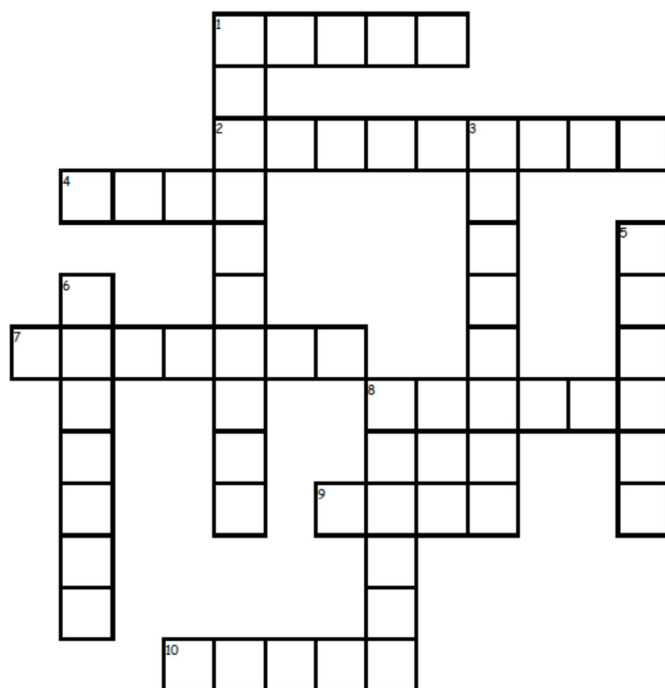
