

THE ICON OF OUR LADY OF PERPETUAL HELP

(printed on the front cover)

Iconography is a symbolic art, its purpose being to express both the theological teaching of the Church and its spirituality in symbolic form. Before painting an icon, the artist spends much time in fasting and prayer, and so the image is said to be written with prayer. Praying with an icon is a development of the prayer with which it was painted.

The icon of Our Mother of Perpetual Help is the special place where Mary meets the suppliant in prayer and help. As is the norm with Mother and Child icons, the basic doctrinal content of the image is represented by abbreviations written near the figures portrayed. Thus in the Perpetual Help icon, the initial and final letters of the two Greek words for 'Jesus Christ' are near the head of the Infant. Those on either side of the Madonna represent 'Mother of God'. So we have the Incarnation visually represented.

Looking more closely at the icon, we see a story visualized. In the background we find the Archangels Michael and Gabriel depicted. The former holds instruments of Christ's passion: a lance, a reed and sponge while the latter holds a cross and nails. The Infant is shown in a state of fear, disturbed by a vision of His future death. Agitated, He moves His head from side to side, and in the movement loses one of His sandals. Both His hands are placed in His Mother's right hand as He grasps it for support.


Her eyes look to us as if inviting us in our difficulties to approach Her with great confidence and to trust Her in our fears, doubts and anxieties. They assure us that Her Son underwent the torments of Calvary because of His love for us. They remind us that She is our Mother: that She loves each of us with a very special and personal love: and that She is perpetually interceding for us at the throne of God.

Both the Christ Child and the Virgin Mother are crowned, and the background of the icon is of gold to remind us of eternal life. 'Be faithful until death and I will give you the crown of life.'

Thus the Mother of Perpetual Help icon is one that visually portrays for us the total message of the Incarnation. It gives the identity of Christ as true God and true man; it tells of His sharing the sufferings of life; and it reminds us of our destiny to share in the love of God for all eternity. Moreover it powerfully advises us in the difficulties of life to seek help from the Mother of God, just as Jesus did.

The eyes of the Madonna of this icon look to us as if to recall, 'I gave My Son for your redemption. I too shared in His suffering. I understand your fears and your difficulties because I too had to walk the road of faith. Do not be overwhelmed by the trials of life, but place your hands as Jesus did in mine, and do not be afraid. I will intercede with My Son for you. I will be for you your Mother of Perpetual Help. This icon is the place where I will meet your every need.'

LAST CHANCE FOR PLANNED GIVING TAX RECEIPTS

Parishioners who require a tax receipt for Planned Giving for the 2020/2021 financial year must notify the Parish Office by 30 June 2021.

Please notify by one of the following methods:

Email to <u>newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au</u> - Use the wording, "Please provide me with a Planned Giving tax receipt" and include your name and envelope number. **Phone**: Call the Parish Office on 4979 1101.

Tax receipt data will be processed on 30 June 2021 and requests must be made by that date.

No subsequent amendments are possible. Any requests received after 30 June 2021 will result in parishioners not receiving a tax receipt. In turn, they will not be able to claim a tax deduction. If you do not require a tax receipt for tax purposes, it is preferable not to request one, as this will enhance the tax deductibility for those who do use the tax receipt. If you do not submit a tax return (and therefore do not require a tax receipt), we can provide you with written confirmation of your contribution total. You can request this by emailing or by phoning the parish office.

Please note that due to limitations imposed by Section 83C of the NSW Education Act, letters relating to a School Building Levy (DFSBL) reduction can no longer be offered by the Parish.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Churches

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 2 square metres per person within the building.

In our Region, those limits are:

Sacred Heart Cathedral	221
St Mary's, Newcastle	108
St Joseph's, The Junction	200
Mary Immaculate, Tighes Hill	110
St Laurence O'Toole, Broadmeadow	110
St Peter-in-Chains, Stockton	140
Christ the King, Mayfield West	140

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, such as weddings and funerals.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival. These details must be recorded for each attendee.

Attendees are able to use the Service NSW QR Code to provide their details—just like many other places—using the Service NSW app on your phone, or via a QR Code reader. A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details.

General Requirements

The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

Liturgical rituals have been adapted, and will continue to be adapted, in order to ensure the health and safety of all parishioners and visitors to our churches. We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

Requirements for Attending Mass

There is no need to register in advance to attend regular Mass. If you wish to return to Mass, you are at liberty to do so, though capacity limits will need to be observed at all Masses.

FEAST DAYS OF MARY

Marian feasts originate ultimately or primarily by ecclesial decision. The Church decides whether they should be local, regional or universal, and what degree of solemnity should be attributed to them (solemnity, feast, memorial) depending on the importance of the theme celebrated. Marian feasts are distinguished with the following categories:

- 1. Feasts based on events related in scripture (for example, Annunciation)
- 2. Feasts that are object of dogmatic statements (for example, Immaculate Conception)
- 3. Feasts that arose thanks to popular devotion and/or some special event (for example, Our Lady of the Rosary)
- 4. Feasts with geographical connection based on apparitions or other special events (for example, Lourdes)

January 1 — Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God

February 2 — Presentation of the Lord

February 11 — Our Lady of Lourdes

March 25 — Annunciation

May 13 — Our Lady of Fatima

May 24 — Our Lady Help of Christians

May 31 — Visitation

June 27 — Our Mother of Perpetual Help

July 16 — Our Lady of Mount Carmel

August 15 — Assumption

August 22 — Queenship of Mary

September 8 — Birth of Mary

September 12 — The Most Holy Name of Mary

September 15 — Our Lady of Sorrows

October 7 — Our Lady of the Rosary

November 21 — Presentation of the Blessed Virgin

Mary December 8 — Immaculate Conception

The Month of Mary is May.

The Month of the Rosary is October.

The Feast of the Immaculate Heart is the Saturday following the Second Sunday after Pentecost.

The First Saturday of each Month is also dedicated to Marian Devotions.

The Lily is a symbol of virginity and purity. There is also a white day lily which only blooms during the time of the Assumption in mid-August and is known as the Assumption Lily among horticulturalists. The species here is very similar to the Assumption flower.



OUR PATRONAL FEAST

Our Lady of Perpetual Help is the patron of our 'Particular Church.' The image of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is an icon, painted on wood, and seems to have originated around the thirteenth century. Traditionally, the image is also known as "Our Lady of Perpetual Succour." According to popular tradition, a merchant acquired the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help from the island of Crete and had it shipped to Rome towards the end of the fifteenth century. During the voyage, a terrible storm arose, threatening the lives of all on ship. The passengers and crew prayed to our Blessed Mother, and were saved.

Once in Rome, the merchant, dying, ordered that the image should be displayed for public veneration. His friend, who retained the image, received further instructions: in a dream to his little daughter, the Blessed Mother appeared and expressed the desire for the image to be venerated in a Church between the Basilicas of St. Mary Major and St. John Lateran in Rome. The image, consequently, was housed at the Church of St. Matthew, and became known as "The Madonna of Saint Matthew." Pilgrims flocked to the church for the next three hundred years, and great graces were bestowed upon the faithful.

After Napoleon's troops destroyed the Church of St. Matthew in 1812, the image was transferred to the Church of St. Mary in Posterula, and remained there for nearly forty years. There, the image was neglected and forgotten.

By divine providence, the forgotten image was rediscovered. In 1866, Blessed Pope Pius IX entrusted the image to the Redemptorists, who had just built the Church of St. Alphonsus, down the street from St. Mary Major. As a boy, the Holy Father had prayed before the image in the Church of St. Matthew. He ordered the public display and veneration of the image, and fixed the feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help as the Sunday before the Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist. In 1867, when the image was being carried in a solemn procession through the streets, a young child was cured, the first of many recorded miracles attributed to Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

To this day, the Church of St. Alphonsus displays the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and welcomes pilgrims for prayer. May each of us never hesitate to invoke the prayers and intercession of Our Blessed Mother in time of need.

Mary's signature flower is the rose. As Cardinal Henry Newman wrote:



mother of Jesus. Many are rose gardens, but others also contain many different types of lilies, marguerites, marigolds, virgin's bower clematis, rosemary, and many other flowers that are associated with Mary, too.
