



gospel focus

Changing expectations

The early audience of the gospel accounts would have known exactly what was meant by crucifixion. It was an all too familiar reality for them as the Romans sought to suppress any suggestion of opposition to their rule. The early audience would have recognised that the account of Jesus' death and burial was not in keeping with their knowledge of what normally happened. They would have known that something special was being conveyed through this story. They would have known that the story of his death was only a prelude to the real story of Jesus' passion - his resurrection.

For Palm Sunday, I wanted to bring a lovely bouquet of anemones. However, the sanctuary was already decorated with palm branches. Fr Andrew said, "With fronds like these, who needs anemones?"

REFLECTION BY FR MICHAEL TATE

Lowly Prince of Peace

Today is the only Sunday we hear two Gospels proclaimed.

One is of the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The other is of the expulsion of Jesus from Jerusalem.

The entry is accompanied by shouts of praise: 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!'

The expulsion is accompanied by the baying for blood: 'Crucify him! Crucify him!'

We are all familiar with the story. Many in Jerusalem had been hoping for a Messianic Liberator in the great warrior tradition of King David. Surely he would enter Jerusalem on a magnificent warhorse, signalling the start of the overthrow of Roman rule?

But, what did they get? A lowly figure riding on a donkey.

Nevertheless, the disciples and the crowd applauded him, laying palms on the road before him, singing out 'Hosanna in the highest'.

'Hosanna' means 'Save us'. Our Lord wanted to save them, of course: to save them from their impulse to destroy others which would eventually end up destroying themselves.

However, this Jesus on a donkey wanted to bring peace on earth, as the angels had sung at his birth. For him, this had to be achieved by non-violent means.

But the supporters and opponents of Roman rule preferred that a convicted terrorist — Barabbas — be set free. They knew his modus operandi. They knew what box to put him in. They had plenty of experience of his type.

But they could not deal with the practitioner of active, revolutionary non-violence. So the inevitable unfolded.

As we know, the disciples harboured an informer – Judas. The disciples themselves found that their courage and bravado crumbled in the face of the temple guards and Roman soldiers.

Jesus was arrested and subjected to various show trials. The crowd proved fickle. Jesus was left exposed to Pontius Pilate who had Jesus expelled from the city and apparently from life.

The charismatic Jesus could have organised armed resistance but he demanded that Peter put his sword back in its scabbard. Why?

I think largely because he knew how the innocent suffer terribly in these conflicts, particularly women. What does he say to the women of Jerusalem as he laboured up the hill of Calvary? Jesus says:

'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me. Weep rather for yourselves and for your children...'

Jesus saw that it is women who suffer grievously in warfare:

the loss of fathers, husbands, sons and lovers killed on the battlefield;

the sexual abuse of women as an instrument to terrorise the civilian population, or enforced prostitution, sexual slavery.

Jesus knew all this and his heart broke: 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me. Weep rather for yourselves and for your children...'

As they certainly did forty years later when the Romans ruthlessly put down armed rebellion. Jerusalem was laid waste and the Temple destroyed.

No doubt we can admire Jesus for going to martyrdom in this way. But deep in our hearts do we not fear following him in his non-violent resistance to evil. We could be killed, or those we love or should protect could be killed.

This creates a humanly impossible tension for us – the tension between imitating Christ in this regard and following our natural human instinct to deal with an aggressor threatening lethal violence.

A good starting point for reflection is that the Church was profoundly pacifist for its first three hundred years.

Perhaps it is for the Church of the 21st century to rise to the challenge.

Perhaps it is for a Pope who has chosen the name of Francis (of Assisi) to rise to the challenge issued by the One who entered Jerusalem borne on a donkey the One expelled from Jerusalem bearing a cross, Jesus of Nazareth

Historical Context

Crucifixion

The Romans used crucifixion as a deterrent against insurrection and rebellion. Not only was it an agonising death it was usually a slow, drawn out death – taking days to die. Victims were always crucified in public settings; alongside main thoroughfares or on hilltops outside a city. The victims were left on the cross for weeks while birds and wild dogs ate their bodies. The idea of crucifixion was that nothing was left to bury as this was the ultimate domination and humiliation of the rebel. The account of Jesus dying within a few hours is very unusual.
