
DIOCESAN REFLECTION DAY ON OUR SPIRITUAL FOUNDATIONS

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

NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY

God is God of the living

2 Thessalonians 2:16 – 3:5; Luke 20:27-38

Answering a trick question

In Paul's letter today, we find a much misunderstood term – grace. In Greek it is the word 'Charis' and is like our words, charism or charismatic. Its basic meaning in Greek is a freely bestowed gift, something given from the goodness and kindness of the giver. Words like gratuitous or gracious come close to expressing this sense of an utterly free gift. So when Paul writes that God 'has given us his love, and through his grace such in exhaustible comfort,' it might be better to substitute, 'through God's gracious love'. Grace is that aspect of love that is poured out freely, with no ties, no obligations, no sense of merit or earning such love – it is pure gift. This has been the message of Luke in describing God's mercy to all.

There were many varieties of Judaism at the time of Jesus - in the gospels we hear of just a few of these different forms: Pharisees, Sadducees and the Zealots. From other Jewish sources we know of other groups such as the Essenes who lived by the Dead Sea and are likely to have been the group whose writings were preserved in the Dead Sea Scrolls. The Pharisees were lay people, not priests, who were open to new ideas. While following the Law of Moses, they also tried to interpret the Law to make it relevant for each age. They were also open to new theological ideas that were not written in the Law. During his teaching, Jesus would have looked a little like a Pharisee, as he was a lay person, and he also was a teacher who was reinterpreting the Law. At the time of Jesus, the group most threatened by him would have been the Sadducees. Another group were the Sadducees who were the wealthier class of Jewish society and were members of the High Priestly families and so had great influence and religious power. This was the group, as Priests, who had great influence over the Temple and its rituals. Unlike the Pharisees, the Sadducees were far more conservative and believed only what was written in the Law of Moses and did not allow for a growth in theological understanding. In the year 70 CE the Romans destroyed Jerusalem following a Jewish uprising. During this war the Zealots were hunted down and defeated, and the power of the Sadducees was also destroyed with the loss of the great Temple in Jerusalem. With no Temple, there were no sacrifices and therefore no need for a group of Priests. It is the Sadducees who are at the centre of today's Gospel.

The Sadducees did not accept the concept of resurrection from the dead, which was a concept that developed quite late in Judaism, around 200 BCE. Since this idea was not written in the Hebrew Scriptures, they denied it.

At this stage in the Gospel, Jesus is teaching within the Temple and the Sadducees put to him this ridiculous scenario in order to make fun of his teaching. They draw on the Jewish law that if a man dies without offspring, his widow must marry the man's brother in order to preserve the lifeblood of his family. With no belief in resurrection, a person could only hope to live on through their children, hence the importance of continuing the family line. Jesus' answer points out that those participating in the resurrection of the dead will not die so there is no need to maintain their lifeblood through begetting children. He then challenges them to really listen to their Law and be open to the truth it teaches about God.

Today's Gospel asks us to check where we stand. Are we open to the idea that our knowledge of God can develop, grow and change? It's not that God changes, but our human knowledge and insights can and do develop. The theology of the first century developed when it moved into a Greek speaking world. Later, with the development of philosophical schools of reasoning, theology developed further. Today, as our world view expands with ideas of a universe that is billions of years old and which is evolving and expanding, our theology must also reconceptualise our faith if it is to be relevant to our age. Commitment to the truth requires openness bigger than that shown by the Sadducees.

REFLECTION

Today's Gospel focuses on those nagging questions that plague us all from time to time. What will heaven be like? What will happen to me in the resurrection of the body? While these are interesting enough questions on which to speculate and pray, this story from Dan McAuley reminds us that resurrection and a taste of heaven are often closer than we think.

'One day when I was in my early years of High School I noticed this boy from my class walking home from school. His name was Kyle. It looked like he was carrying all of his books. I thought to myself, "Why would anyone bring home all his books on a Friday? He must really be a nerd." I had quite a weekend planned (parties and a football game with my friends the next afternoon), so I shrugged my shoulders and went on. As I was walking, I saw a bunch of kids running toward him. They knocked all his books out of his arms and tripped him up so he landed in the dirt. His glasses went flying, and I saw them land in the grass about ten feet from him. He looked up and I saw this terrible sadness in his eyes. My heart went out to him. So, I jogged over to him as he crawled around looking for his glasses, and I saw a tear in his eye.

'As I handed him his glasses, I said, "Those guys are jerks. They really should get lives." He looked at me and just said, "Thanks!" There was a big smile on his face. It was one of those smiles that showed real gratitude. I helped him pick up his books, and asked him where he lived. As it turned out, he lived near me, so I asked him why I had never seen him before. He said he had gone to another school before now. We talked all the way home, and I helped him carry his books. He turned out to be a pretty cool guy. I asked him if he wanted to play football on Saturday with me and my friends. We hung out all weekend and the more I got to know Kyle, the more I liked him, and my friends thought the same.

'Monday morning came, and there was Kyle with the huge stack of books again. I stopped him and said, "Boy, you are going to really build some serious muscles with this pile of books every day!" He just laughed and handed me half the books. Over the next four years, Kyle and I became best friends. When we were in our last year of school we began to think about university. Kyle wanted to study overseas, I was going to stay at home. I knew wherever we were that we would always be friends, that the miles would never be a problem.

'Kyle topped our class at school. I teased him all the time about being a nerd. He had to prepare a speech

for graduation. I was so glad it wasn't me having to get up there and speak. But when he took the microphone he looked great. He was one of those guys that really found himself during high school. He filled out and actually looked good in glasses. He had more dates than I had and all the girls loved him. Sometimes I was jealous.

'Today was one of those days. I could see that he was nervous about his speech. So, I smacked him on the back and said, "Hey, big guy, you'll be great!" He looked at me with one of those looks (the really grateful one) and smiled. "Thanks," he said. As he started his speech, he cleared his throat, and began. "Graduating from school is a time when you can thank those who helped you make it through the tough years. Your parents, your teachers, your siblings, maybe a coach, but mostly your friends. I am here to tell all of you that being a friend to another person can save someone from hell. Let me tell you a story."

'I just looked at my friend with disbelief as he told the story of the first day we met. He had planned to kill himself over the weekend. He talked of how he had cleaned out his locker so his mother wouldn't have to do it later and was carrying all his stuff home. He looked hard at me and gave me a little smile. "Thankfully, my friend saved me from doing the unspeakable. I looked at hell, but the kindness of a friend showed me heaven. And he didn't even know it and I haven't looked back since.""

If we want to know what heaven or the resurrection is like, then Jesus says, go and do likewise.

The Sadducees quote the Law of Moses at Jesus but he goes one better by quoting the very conversation when Moses encountered God in the burning bush. In this encounter, God reveals Godself to be the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. God does not say, I was the God of Abraham, but rather I am the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. This distinction confirms that the relationship is ongoing, not stuck in a time before their death. It is in this same encounter that God reveals God's name as "I am who am" – represented in Hebrew by the letters YHWH from which we get Yahweh.
