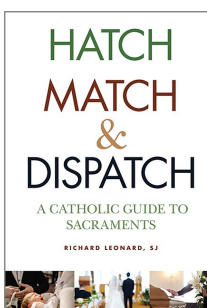
SACRED HEART CATHEDRAL and ST MARY'S, NEWCASTLE:

Since June 2022, CatholicCare Food Programs have made up 138 emergency food hampers and 150 Christmas hampers for people in the Newcastle-Lake Macquarie area, all from donated food items. This year we have seen a dramatic increase in the number of requests we have received for emergency food hampers, especially from families with young children. Our hampers are given as a one off 'hand up' (not a 'hand out') and are made up completely of donated food.

If you would like to donate, any of the following types of non-perishable items would be most gratefully received: UHT milk, cereal, jam, vegemite, peanut butter, tinned veggies, fruit, soup, fish, meat, dried pasta, rice, pasta sauces, teabags, coffee, biscuits, crackers, custard, jelly, toothpaste, toothbrushes, soap, shampoo, conditioner (even the travel sized ones from hotels), deodorant. Historical Context Pentecost

The word Pentecost comes from the Greek for fiftieth day. Pentecost Sunday ends the season of Easter and comes as a Sabbath day after seven weeks of seven days. In Jewish tradition the 50th day after the Passover was celebrated as a blessing of the harvest and rather than the unleavened bread of Passover it was celebrated by leavening the bread. It was for this reason that the disciples were gathered together when they experienced the Holy Spirit empowering them. In Christian tradition, Pentecost is celebrated as the arrival of the Spirit, promised by Jesus, that animated the disciples to spread the gospel of Jesus and gather believers to form what would eventually become the Church.

NOTICE TO PLANNED GIVERS - THE END OF FINANCIAL YEAR IS COMING!

Planned Giving Tax Receipts: Parishioners who require a tax receipt for planned giving for the 2022/2023 financial year must notify the Parish Office ***before 30th June 2023.***

Please submit requests in writing by one of the following methods:

Email to newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au: Use the wording, *"Please provide me with a Planned Giving tax receipt"* and include your name and envelope number.

Planned Giving Envelope: Write on your weekly envelope, *"Tax receipt required"*.

Tax receipt data will be processed on 30 June 2023. If you make a request after that date you will not be eligible for a receipt, nor for a tax deduction in relation to your planned giving contributions. This is because there is a designated sum that can be attributed to planned giving receipts and, once this distribution has occurred on 30 June 2023, no further allocations are possible.

The 'designated sum' provision also means that the claimable amount for each giver decreases when more people request a receipt. We therefore request that if you do not intend to claim a tax deduction, please do not request a receipt.

For those who do not claim a tax deduction but would like their contribution acknowledged, we can provide, on request, a letter confirming your contribution total.

SAFEGUARDING

Do you know about safeguarding? Last week we began a ten-part series addressing each of the Safeguarding Standards.

The second standard highlights the requirement to ensure people are informed and listened to when making decisions. The second standard, CHILDREN AND ADULTS ARE SAFE, INFORMED AND PARTICIPATE has 1 competency with 4 criteria.

Competency: Children and adults are informed about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously

Comment: There are a number of critical elements in this competency including the responsibility to ensure that a person has the right to make informed decisions in which they are supported and have a respected voice.

Criteria 2.1: Children and adults at risk engaged in an entity's ministry and/or services are informed about their rights, including safety, decision making, participation and how a complaint will be managed.

Comment: Engaging in an age-appropriate manner for the purpose of explaining the rights of a person and to ensure that a person feels safe to express their views and decisions. Carers (where appropriate) are now included in this criterion. Knowing who to contact if concerned is included.

Criteria 2.2: The importance of friendships is recognised and support from peers is encouraged, helping children feel safe and less isolated.

Comment: This requirement becomes increasingly critical as our children enter adolescence, our responsibility is not diminished by age.

Criteria 2.3: The importance of relationships and social connections for adults at risk is recognised and encouraged, helping them to feel safe and less isolated.

Comment: Adults at risk are informed about safe and respectful relationships

Criteria 2.4: Where relevant to the setting or context, children and families are offered access to abuse prevention programs and related information that is age appropriate.

Comment: There is now a responsibility to offer access to services appropriate to the age and stage of the person. The inclusion of families extends the brief to any family abuse situations.

REFLECTION

“On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked...” (John 20:19). Pentecost is the feast of locked doors—that are suddenly blown open!

It's the feast of isolation, fear, suspicion, betrayals, abandonment, and near despair—all dismissed by a resurrected Jesus whose first spoken words are “Peace be with you.”

No recriminations. No finger-pointing. No blaming. Only words of forgiveness. Pentecost is the feast that reminds us of that bunch of people who so wanted to do nothing else but sneak away, go into hiding, and wallow in their guilt and shame.

Yet, to our surprise, the Spirit of second chances breaks down the door and, with a love so vast, the ugliest kind of guilt and humiliation is instantly forgiven. The Spirit of new life rushes in like a great wind and embraces each one of them with a sense of peace so profound that the doors of their souls fly open and a great fire lights their hearts.

Then, an even greater surprise takes place: Jesus chooses them—the very ones who abandoned and betrayed him—to be the wounded, forgiven healers that are to preach the good news of God's great love and mercy. The very ones who handed him over now become the same ones who will begin a new community—a community eventually consisting of people like you and me.

Pentecost, the feast of locked doors, becomes a feast of confrontation, of challenge. It doesn't just let us sit back and be amazed at its great imagery of fire and wind and blown-open doors. It demands that each of us search our own soul in answer the challenge of deep self-exploration: Where are the locked doors in your life? Where do you find your own self isolated in fear, living behind emotionally sealed doors, hanging on to anger and refusing to come out of hiding?



Pentecost is not just something miraculous and stupendous that happened some 2,000 years ago. It's an event that needs to happen in each of our lives — now!

In the book, *Naked and You Clothed Me*, Fr. William Bausch tells the story of a 41-year-old man named Tom who was dying of AIDS.

“His parents lived in so much shame because of this that they literally locked him in an upstairs bedroom so that no one could see him. The priest then tells how when he was finally allowed to go up to his room and visit with him, he bent over to kiss Tom on the forehead and then took his hand in his own. The emaciated, bed-ridden man whispered to the priest with tears streaming down his face, ‘No one touches me anymore.’... His father remained behind a closed door—until Tom died. At the wake, he finally broke down and opened the closed door of his soul, and wept with shame over his neglect and abandonment.”

Locked doors were blown open.

Pentecost promises us that the Holy Spirit can be released in each of us: the Spirit of fire that can burn away our meanness, the Spirit of wind that can sweep away our desire for revenge; the Spirit of blown-open doors that can usher us into an inner peace that can transform our hearts of hate.

It is for these reasons that we pray together as a Pentecost community: “Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and we shall renew the face of the earth.”

HOMILY OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS SOLEMNITY OF PENTECOST (2020)

“There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit” (1 Cor 12:4), as the Apostle Paul writes to the Corinthians. He continues: “There are different forms of service, but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone” (vv. 5-6).

Diversity and unity: Saint Paul puts together two words that seem contradictory. He wants to tell us that the Holy Spirit is the *one* who brings together the *many*; and that the Church was born this way: we are all different, yet united by the same Holy Spirit.

Let us go back to the origin of the Church, to the day of Pentecost. Let us look at the Apostles: some of them were fishermen, simple people accustomed to living by the work of their hands, but there were also others, like Matthew, who was an educated tax collector.

They were from different backgrounds and social contexts, and they had Hebrew and Greek names. In terms of character, some were meek and others were excitable; they all had different ideas and sensibilities. They were all different. Jesus did not change them; he did not make them into a set of pre-packaged models. No. He left their differences and now he unites them by anointing them with the Holy Spirit.

With the *anointing* comes their *union* – *union* in diversity. At Pentecost, the Apostles understand the unifying power of the Spirit. They see it with their own eyes when everyone, though speaking in different languages, comes together as one people: the people of God, shaped by the Spirit, who weaves unity from diversity and bestows harmony because in the Spirit there *is* harmony. He himself *is* harmony.

Let us now focus on ourselves, the Church of today. We can ask ourselves: “What is it that unites us, what is the basis of our unity?”. We too have our differences, for example: of opinions, choices, sensibilities. But the temptation is always fiercely to defend our ideas, believing them to be good for everybody and agreeing only with those who think as we do.

This is a bad temptation that brings division. But this is a faith created in our own image; it is not what the Spirit wants. We might think that what unite us are our beliefs and our morality. But there is much more: our principle of unity is the Holy Spirit. He reminds us

that first of all we are *God’s beloved children*; all equal, in this respect, and all different. The Spirit comes to us, in our differences and difficulties, to tell us that we have one Lord – Jesus – and one Father, and that for this reason we are brothers and sisters!

Let us begin anew from here; let us look at the Church with the eyes of the Spirit and not as the world does. The world sees us only as on the right or left, with one ideology or the other; the Spirit sees us as sons and daughters of the Father and brothers and sisters of Jesus. The world sees conservatives and progressives; the Spirit sees children of God. A worldly gaze sees structures to be made more efficient; a spiritual gaze sees brothers and sisters pleading for mercy. The Spirit loves us and knows everyone’s place in the grand scheme of things: for him, we are not bits of confetti blown about by the wind, rather we are irreplaceable fragments in his mosaic.

Brothers and sisters, let us pray to him: Holy Spirit, memory of God, revive in us the memory of the gift received. Free us from the paralysis of selfishness and awaken in us the desire to serve, to do good. Even worse than this crisis is the tragedy of squandering it by closing in on ourselves.
