

SCPIPTUPAL CONTEXT Psalm 22

Today's responsorial psalm uses Psalm 22 (sometimes referenced as Psalm 23), 'the Lord is my shepherd'. It is a very popular psalm and is often reproduced on Christian posters and other artworks. It was also a popular psalm and image at the time of Jesus. For Jesus to describe himself as the good shepherd caused great distress among the Jewish officials. They saw Jesus as being blasphemous for the psalm makes clear that the Lord is the shepherd. Jesus quite deliberately makes clear that he and the Father are one: the Lord is the shepherd and Jesus is the good shepherd.

Since June 2022, CatholicCare Food Programs have made up 138 emergency food hampers and 150 Christmas hampers for people in the Newcastle-Lake Macquarie area, all from donated food items. WHY JOHN?

You may have noticed that during the Easter season, we have been hearing exclusively from the gospel of John. But aren't we in Year A of the liturgical cycle — the year of Matthew? Well, yes, but ... The gospel of the year is predominantly proclaimed during Ordinary Time. However, there is no Year of John. This gospel is read during the Easter season and at other specific feasts and seasons. As the synoptic gospels focus on the life and ministry of Jesus, the theological and metaphoric nature of John's gospel is much more suited to the post-resurrection season of Easter.

Historical Context

A line of shepherds

When Jesus used the image of himself as a shepherd, he named himself as belonging to a Jewish ancestry that associated itself with shepherds. Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Moses were all shepherds. David, the second King of Israel, was regarded as the greatest king in Jewish history. His humble beginning, captured magnificently in the sculpture by Michelangelo, was as a shepherd boy guarding his flock with a slingshot. The kings of Israel were charged to 'shepherd' their people rather than to lord it over them as the pagan kings did.



REFLECTION

Stuff

The famous comedian George Carlin used to do a routine called "stuff" — referring to all the possessions we accumulate and cling to so dearly. Here are some things he said about "stuff":

"The whole meaning of life is trying to find a place for our stuff. That's what your house is — a place to put all your stuff. Your house is really just a pile of stuff with a cover on it. It's a place to keep your stuff while you go out and get more stuff. You then have to buy a bigger house because you've run out of room for all your stuff, and you have to have more space for more stuff."

He pointed out how addicted we can become to our possessions, leading to the simple yet profound question: "Do you own your stuff or does your stuff own you?"

In contrast to all this fascination with "stuff," today's Gospel of John ends with these striking, hope-filled words: "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." But what does Jesus mean by the word "abundantly"? Is he referring to the acquisition of more stuff, more possessions, more things, more gadgets?

Quite the contrary. What Jesus is really talking about is our openness to receiving a gift, a grace. It is the grace we find when we believe that only God can fill the hole in our soul. And, it comes precisely when we abandon the incessant acquisition of more and more stuff.

Jesus is talking today about that down-deep emptiness in our lives — an emptiness that all the "stuff" in the world just doesn't seem to fill up. He's talking about our most fundamental need to feel that our lives are ultimately about something far richer and deeper than the stuff we so crave.

Ultimately, Jesus is talking about developing an "abundance mentality," a way of thinking and acting that says: "There is enough for everyone, more than enough food, love ... everything!" When we live with this mind-set, we begin to see the miracle of what we give away multiplying to the point of having plenty left over.

"Abundance mentality" is the opposite of a "scarcity mentality" that wants to hold back, refuse to share, and keep only for ourselves.

Almost one in six people live in poverty. Experts say that food banks and organizations that assist with housing, utilities and transportation costs, report an increasing need for assistance from people who made donations in the past but now come seeking aid for

themselves!

Globally, the numbers are even more alarming: Nearly half of all children live in poverty and far too many die of easily preventable diseases. It's estimated that 80 percent of all people on the planet live on less than ten dollars a day; even worse, many work in abysmal conditions for almost no pay. Abundance is a word most people throughout the world wouldn't even understand or comprehend. Yet, we do — because material abundance is all around us.

The problem for many of us, is that too often we think it refers only to the garnering of more stuff. Jesus is trying to help us understand in today's Gospel, and throughout his whole ministry, that true abundance comes not from what we possess, but from how deeply we love, how generously we share.

Jesus sends each of us an invitation: Spend less time acquiring more stuff and more time developing a mind-set of abundance, an abundance mentality.



IS IT PSALM 22 OR 23?

For centuries the Catholic Church has used the Latin Vulgate psalter translated from the Greek Septuagint (from the third century before Christ)

In 1979, however, Blessed Pope John Paul II promulgated a new base text of the Latin Bible, the neo-Vulgate, as the official text from which translations should be made.

The Neo-Vulgate largely reflects the Hebrew Masoretic Text tradition of manuscripts which differs significantly from the Septuagint/Vulgate tradition in many important respects. A significant difference is in **the numbering:**

- Psalms 1-8, and 148-150 are numbered the same in all versions
- ₱ Psalms 10-112 in the Vulgate = Psalms 11 113 in Neo-Vulgate, and Psalms 116-145 in the Vulgate = Psalms 117-146 in Neo-Vulgate (ie add one number to Vulgate to get Neo-Vulgate number);
- ₱ Psalm 9 in the Vulgate is split into two in the Neo-Vulgate, so becomes Psalms 9 &10;
- ♣ Psalm 113 Vulgate = Psalms 114 & Ps 115 in Neo-Vulgate;
- Psalm 114 & Ps 115 Vulgate = Psalm 116 in Neo-Vulgate;
- **Psalm 146 & Ps 147** Vulgate Psalm 147 Neo-Vulgate.

John 10:10 (I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.) is a very famous quote from this gospel passage. Having life to the full does not imply life filled with every convenience, comfort and wealth. Rather, it is about living a life filled with purpose and intent. If we fail to live with purpose and meaning then our life is a hollow shell of what it could be. Jesus came that we may have life — a life that is at its fullest when it is lived in such a way as to be an expression of what Jesus taught and lived.
