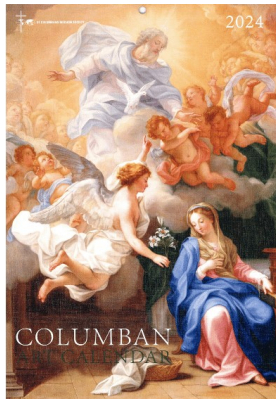

REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

Today is traditionally called *Gaudete* Sunday. Over the first millennium of Christianity Advent was like a late Lent. Both were five weeks long, both were marked by fasting and penance and both gave the faithful a day off half way through. In Lent *Laudete* Sunday is still, roughly, half way through the five-week season. Advent, however, was shortened to four weeks in the tenth century, and Pope St Gregory the Great eased the fasting and penitential aspects of this season in the twelfth century, but the not-so-half-way *Gaudete* Sunday has remained. It is, literally, the 'rejoicing' Sunday when we look more directly at Jesus' coming at Christmas.

To enable us to look at Jesus we start with the man who heralded his mission in the world, John the Baptist. In today's Gospel John the Baptist is the model of humility, opening the way for the Kingdom of Jesus to break in upon the world. We should never underestimate talent spotters, for as this story demonstrates, they all have John the Baptist as their patron saint.

Fleming was a poor Scottish farmer in the nineteenth century. One day, while trying to make a living for his family, he heard a cry for help coming from a nearby bog. He dropped his tools and ran to the bog. There, mired to his waist in black muck, was a terrified boy, screaming and struggling to free himself. Farmer Fleming saved the lad from what could have been a slow and terrifying death.

The next day, a fancy carriage pulled up to the Scotsman's sparse cottage. An elegantly dressed nobleman stepped out and introduced himself as the father of the boy Farmer Fleming had saved. 'I want to repay you,' said the nobleman. 'You saved my son's life.' 'No, I can't accept payment for what I did,' the Scottish farmer replied, waving away the offer.

At that moment, the farmer's own son came to the door of the family home. 'Is that your son?' the nobleman asked. 'Yes,' the farmer replied proudly. 'I'll make you a deal. Let me take him and give him a good education. If the lad is anything like his father, he'll grow up to be a man you can be proud of.' And that is what he did.

In time, Farmer Fleming's son graduated from St Mary's Medical School in London, and went on to become known throughout the world as the noted Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of Penicillin. Years afterward, the nobleman's son was stricken with pneumonia. What saved him? Penicillin.

The nobleman's name? Randolph Churchill. His son's name? Sir Winston Churchill.

John the Baptist, the embodiment of the old covenant, recognises who Jesus is for the world and encourages his foes and friends alike to welcome in the Christ, the new and everlasting Covenant. Just like Farmer Fleming or Lord Randolph Churchill, he could not have known the implications of what he was doing. John the Baptist simply saw Jesus and knew that Love had taken human form. Through his talent spotting and in his promotion of Jesus he enabled the first generation of Christians to see and believe that the promises made to their ancestors had been fulfilled.

No wonder we have him as our focus on *Gaudete* Sunday. And so may we all rejoice today, not only because salvation is always close at hand in Christ the Lord, but because we are also called to spot his love in every act of goodness we see, encourage and promote it as best we can and then watch nature and grace do the rest.

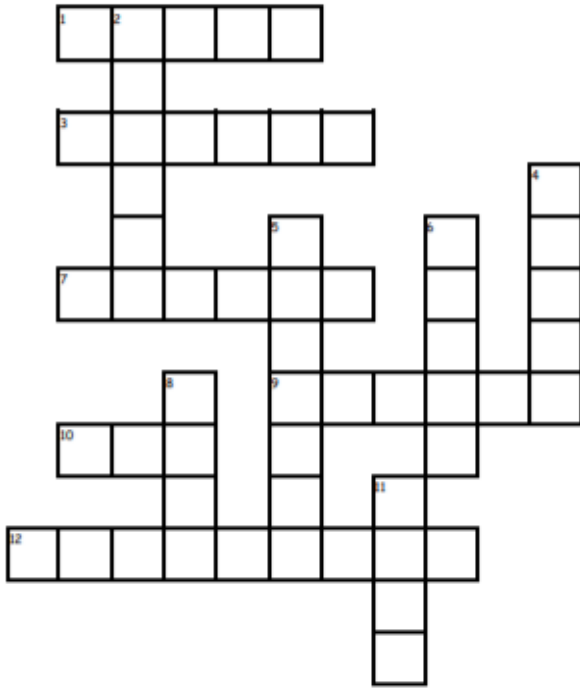

A time to Rejoice!

This Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is the Latin word for Rejoice! Advent was originally celebrated as a five week season and with the same fasting and penitential nature as the season of Lent. The third Sunday, Gaudete, was like a break for rejoicing in the midst of the fasting. When Advent was reduced to four weeks and the nature of the season altered, Gaudete Sunday was retained. The colour of this Sunday is rose – a celebratory colour – and it is reflected in the vestments worn by the priest and in the colour of the third candle used in Advent wreaths.

GOSPEL FOCUS

Same but different

Having the same gospel passage from two different gospels used in the liturgy in consecutive weeks is an ideal opportunity to highlight the different focus adopted by the different gospels. The language of John's gospel is remarkably different from that of the three synoptic gospels (synoptic = 'seen together'). The synoptics share a fairly common narrative style, while John relies much more on metaphor and imagery – it is a more poetic language. In the gospel account of John the Baptist we see in John's gospel greater emphasis on the conversation around what was occurring, while the Markan version emphasises recording the event.

POPE FRANCIS: CHRISTIAN JOY IS NOT EASY, BUT WITH JESUS IT IS POSSIBLE

Vatican City, Gaudete Sunday, Year B

Arriving at Christian joy is no cakewalk, but if we put Jesus at the center of our lives, it is possible to have a joyful faith, Pope Francis said on Sunday.

"The invitation to joy is characteristic of the season of Advent," the pope said in his Angelus address Dec. 13. "This is joy: to point to Jesus."

He reflected on the day's Gospel reading from St. John, and encouraged people to follow the example of St. John the Baptist -- in his joy and in his testimony to the coming of Jesus Christ.

St. John the Baptist "undertook a long journey to come to bear witness to Jesus," he pointed out. "The journey of joy is not a walk in the park. It takes work to always be joyful."

"John left everything, from a young age, to put God first, to listen to his Word with all his heart and all his strength," he continued. "He withdrew into the desert stripping himself of everything superfluous, to be freer to follow the wind of the Holy Spirit."

Speaking from a window overlooking St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis encouraged Catholics to use the occasion of the Third Sunday of Advent, also called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, to reflect on whether they live their faith joyfully, and whether they convey the joy of being a Christian to others.

He lamented that too many Christians look like they are attending a funeral wake. But we have so many reasons to rejoice, he said: "Christ is risen! Christ loves you!"

According to Francis, the first condition necessary for Christian joy is to focus less on one's self and to put Jesus at the center of everything.

This is not about "alienation" from life, he said, because Jesus "is the light that gives full meaning to the life of every man and woman who comes into this world."

"It is the same dynamism of love, which leads me to come out of myself not to lose myself, but to find myself while I give myself, while I seek the good of the other," he explained.

St. John the Baptist is a good example of this, the pope said. As the first witness of Jesus, he achieved his mission not by drawing attention to himself, but by always pointing to "the One who was to come."

"He was always pointing out the Lord," Francis

emphasized. "Like Our Lady: always pointing out the Lord: 'Do what He tells you.' Always the Lord at the center. The saints around, pointing out the Lord." He added: "And whoever does not point out the Lord is not holy!"

"In particular, [John] the Baptist is a model for those in the Church who are called to proclaim Christ to others: they can do so only in detachment from themselves and from worldliness, not by attracting people to themselves but by directing them to Jesus," Pope Francis stated.

The Virgin Mary is an example of a joyful faith, he concluded. "This is why the Church calls Mary 'Cause of our joy.'"
