THE GREATEST GIFT

Have you noticed that on Mothers' Day, the gifts which mothers seem to most appreciate are the simplest: a drawing however scribbled or daubed with paint with the words 'I love you Mum'; a posy of flowers from the garden tied with a little ribbon; breakfast in bed (with the crumbs from the burnt toast in the sheets for days afterwards!).

It seems that the gift which means the most is the one into which the son or daughter has put something of themselves.

When we celebrate the Feast of the Assumption, we celebrate the most superlative Mothers' Day. Our Risen Lord Jesus Christ gave to His mother not merely something of Himself, but everything of Himself, His own life, His own resurrection life.

He gave to her a share in His glorified humanity: bodysoul transformed, transfigured into the heavenly dimension of existence.

But Our Lord does not limit His generosity. He wants all of us, he wants the whole of humankind, indeed He wants the whole of the cosmos to share in His transformed, transfigured existence.

We believe that when we come forward at Holy Communion we take into ourselves the transformed, glorified humanity of Our Risen Lord Jesus Christ.

When we take the sacrament under the appearance of bread, under the appearance of wine, we so eat and drink that, in the wonderful words of Pope John Paul II: 'We digest, as it were, the secret of the Resurrection.'

For a short time, we anticipate in our own bodies what Mary now fully and eminently experiences.

As Our Lord assures us in today's gospel: 'Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood *has* eternal life.' Note the present tense: *has* eternal life, i.e. Divine Life as mediated through our participation in Christ.

That it is why it is important in normal circumstances to accept the consecrated wine from the chalice and not to take the sacrament just under the appearance of the consecrated bread.

When I was a boy (is it so long ago?) it was still the rule at Mass that only the priest drank from the chalice. One of the great actions of the Church over the last forty years is the recovery of the ancient practice of offering Holy Communion under both kinds.

Not only is the reception of both consecrated bread

and consecrated wine in harmony with today's gospel, but it also clearly fulfils Our Lord's command: 'Take, eat ... take, drink.'

Of course, Our Risen Lord is really and wholly present under the appearance of either the bread or wine. They are consecrated separately as did Our Lord at the Last Supper.

Let us thank God for this gift, this opportunity, beyond any human expectation or reckoning.

It is the Risen Lord whom we ingest at Holy Communion. When we do so, we do so with the words of today's Gospel resonating in our own bodies: 'He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him.'

What an anticipation for a short time of that which Our Lady now experiences fully and forever. What a communion! What a Holy Communion!

Mass to be Celebrated in the Latin tridentine Rite

For many years, the diocese has provided opportunities for Catholics wishing to attend Mass and pray according to the liturgical books of 1962. Since COVID we have had some difficulty finding a priest qualified and available to celebrate this Mass. Since the diocese no longer has priests who are able to celebrate the 1962 liturgy in conformity with *Traditionis Custodes*, the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle has entered an agreement with the Fraternity of St Peter, District of Oceania (FSSP), to provide a priest to meet the sacramental needs of this Community.

Fr Richard Wallace, FSSP is being appointed as the Latin Mass Chaplain for the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. Mass will be every Sunday, starting 18 August 2024 at 9.30am at St John the Baptist Oratory, Cathedral St Maitland.

SEEKING YOUR ASSISTANCE WITH THE 'ABSENT FROM THE TABLE' RESEARCH PROJECT

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference is undertaking a research project aimed at investigating why some Catholics do not participate in regular weekly Sunday Mass (Sunday Mass includes the Saturday Vigil). The project will provide in-depth information about contemporary religious practices and beliefs of Catholics in Australia. The insights would enable parishes, movements, and school communities to respond to the trends in participation in the Church, update the Church's awareness and understanding of the present-day context, and enable responses and collaboration around the underlying factors for non/ dis-engagement.



SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY by Dianne Bergant CSA

The mysterious figure of Wisdom, who prepares a banquet, may be either an ancient deity or a cosmic being. If Wisdom is an ancient deity, the house would be a temple with seven pillars, and the banquet would be a sacrificial feast. If she is a cosmic being, her house would be the universe built on the foundation of seven heavenly bodies, and her banquet would consist of the life-giving forces that sustain all creations. Each perspective offers an interesting interpretation, though no one of them can make any conclusive claims. Wisdom feeds the desire for knowledge and insight; she encourages true worship; and she oversees the mysteries of the universe.

The psalm response is part of an acrostic, a poem whose structure follows the order of the alphabet. In the first part of the poem, the psalmist thanks God for having been delivered from distress and invites others to join in praising God. The attitude of the psalmist gives witness to others and develops into a pedagogical technique, teaching others to act in the same way. The congregation is encouraged to look to the Lord so that they too may rejoice in gratitude. The companions of the psalmist are here encouraged to attach themselves to God and, thereby, to enjoy the blessings that this ensures. The fate of the psalmist is placed before them as an example to follow.

The wisdom instruction continues. Christians are encouraged to live (walk) like the wise. They recognise the decisive point of the moment, and they seize it. Such wisdom is an indispensable trait, especially when the days are evil. The ignorance against which the author warns is the inability to draw prudent conclusions in practical situations. The way of the foolish is said to be under the sway of the spirit of drunkenness. By contrast, the way of the wise is directed by the intoxicating Spirit of God. Prompted by the Spirit, in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Ephesians are told to thank God who is called Father. Living in this manner is the true way of wisdom.

bread of life ends with The а Eucharistic reinterpretation of the manna tradition. In unmistakable language Jesus declares that his flesh is food and his blood is drink. Lest this claim go unnoticed, he states it four times (vv.53-56). 'Flesh and blood' is a common way of characterising a human being. When applied to Jesus, it is a proclamation of the Incarnation. It also calls to mind the victim of sacrifice that is first slaughtered (flesh and blood) and then shared at a cultic meal (food and drink). The living God whom Jesus calls Father is the source of this life; Jesus already enjoys this life because of his intimate union with God; and believers already enjoy it because they feed on Jesus, who is the bread of life.

Real Presence

The Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a central doctrine of the Catholic faith. It is regarded as a revealed truth proved by both scripture and tradition. This week's gospel, indeed the entire 'Bread of Life' discourse (Jn 6:26-72), is an essential passage of scripture that supports the teaching of Christ present in the Eucharist. Along with scripture, the other proof of the doctrine is tradition. Since the first century, only a brief time after the death of Jesus, Christians linked their celebration of Eucharist with the words of Jesus at the last supper - they celebrated Eucharist as a memorial of Jesus.
