FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

One of my very favourite pieces of scripture is Luke 5:4. You will know it as the moment Jesus asks the disciples once he had finished preaching to recast their nets and put out into the deep for a catch. In Latin the piece is 'duc in altum' – put out into the deep – there is a tattoo in that, I am sure. I've used it as my motto for decades. It is emblazoned on the windows of the Cathedral Presbytery in the Archdiocese of Hobart and feels like it has been part of my journey from the moment I began the process to the seminary.



When I look back it took me some seven years to work up the courage to take the first step and apply to the archbishop for entry into the seminary. I went backward and forward weighing up the benefits and negatives during those years. That lack of 'putting out into the deep' delayed what has been a wonderful journey with many opportunities albeit with some challenges and a few difficulties. Sometimes we just have to step off in faith don't we, relying heavily on our relationship with Christ that it will be ok in the end. Very little in life is truly set in concrete and if we happen to get it wrong there is nothing stopping us changing our mind or direction.

It took me over 8 years to get Ordained, taking an 18-month sabbatical in the middle for a little bit of teaching overseas and backpacking around Europe. I do sometimes step back into the boat next to the shore rather than being out 'fishing'. I equate that

though to the time I spend in church and in prayer – time out to hear what God is asking before setting off again. Mass gives the 'resource' or 'food' for the work ahead. I read an application for a job interview a few years back which had a great line in it, worth the interview she received: **'my faith informs my decision making'**. I'll share one day the sign I received which gave me the courage to 'put out into the deep', it happened in prayer and whilst in church.

On the news today I noticed again attacks on our Jewish relatives in Sydney. For us we would say 'how un-Australian' but as Catholics we would also say how 'un-Christian'. We must stand against such bad behaviour, and we shouldn't join in the rhetoric that targets with unjust words and actions our neighbours. Good news though that there is a ceasefire in Gaza. How much destruction and loss of life in that district. I pray each day for peace, knowing you do the same. At my conference recently the facilitator talked about the lifelong trauma that will indelibly printed on the hearts and minds of the very young and impressionable children who have lived through what has unfolded since 6 October 2023. I pray for them too and for an opportunity that they get to experience peace for the rest of their lives.

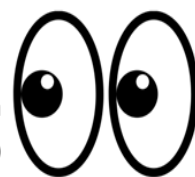

REFLECTION BY FR MICHAEL TATE

Have you ever visited a great cathedral? Usually, the tabernacle of the Glory of the Real Presence of Our Lord is so far distant from the people that it is practically inaccessible, barely able to be seen.

Had the theologians and builders who devised these great edifices read today's gospel? It ends: 'He let his glory *be seen*.' Where? In a nondescript Galilean village at a wedding feast about to become a disaster for the couple.

This is the message of today's gospel. The Divine Presence is no longer remote and distant from you and me and our everyday concerns. The Divine Presence is as close as if we were all at a wedding feast together.

So, what is the story? Something is in danger of going horribly wrong. A young couple are about to be the talk of the village for generations to come. The wine is running out. A fiasco is impending. So, we need a hero to step in and save the situation.

Who is the hero, or perhaps the heroes, who will save the day?

Jesus is a very good candidate. He ended up coming to the rescue. And Catholics would emphasise the 'Mother of Jesus'. She persisted in the face of this retort from her son: 'Woman, what is this to me?' Yes, she was the heroine of the story.

But, the unsung heroes are ... the servants. They took a huge risk. They are going to look utterly stupid if they do what this wedding guest tells them and end up drawing mere water out of the jars to give to the steward.

They took this risk by doing what this stranger told them to do, *exactly*. In fact they were like children. If one asks a ten year old boy to fill a glass, he will fill it to the brim just to test you. The gospel tells us that Jesus said: 'Fill the jars with water' and the response is said to be 'they filled them to the brim'.

And then they started to ladle it out and found they were ladling out 'far better wine than anything served before' and the situation was saved.

How is the Divine Presence of Our Lord Jesus Christ going to come into the everyday occurrences of daily life? Not with great pyrotechnics of thunder and lightning, but with you and with me doing our best to follow what Jesus asks us to do, and sometimes that requires us to become childlike again and to do what he asks *exactly*.

You and I are servants. We are the servants. This requires a certain naivety, and a certain refusal to be embarrassed in front of the crowd for whom what you are doing may seem ridiculous.

A few of you may get the call to do something extreme – filling to the brim – in your imitation of Jesus. Perhaps like St Francis of Assisi, discarding his fine clothes and following Jesus in utter poverty. But for most of us, it will all happen in the usual round of life.

It might be forgiving someone in the family where others in the family think you are fully justified in keeping a cold distance.

It might be caring for the life of a newly conceived or very sick child or elderly parent where the world might suggest more self-serving alternatives.

It might be by being generous, overly generous, with your time or money; time or money which could be spent on yourself, which is what the world expects.

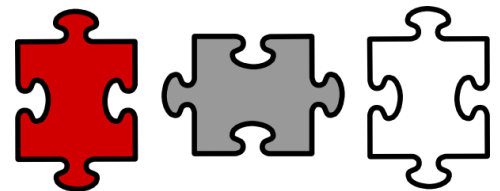
There is a myriad of ways, foolish in the eyes of the crowd, but when you do it like the servants ladling the liquid from those huge pots, you allow the Divine Presence of Our Lord to save the situation.

Then, Cana is there. The creative power of Jesus Christ is there. The Divine Glory *is seen*. The Divine Glory is at work among us.

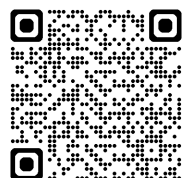

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. To this end, your attention is drawn to **preparing each child for starting or resuming school**. This week and next week, the Safeguarding articles will focus on **10 tips for families** in supporting younger children as they start or resume school.

1. **Visit the school before the first day.** Even if the school is not open, just go to view the buildings and drop off/pick up points.

2. **Go school shopping.** Purchasing of items as “back to school,” like uniform or backpack, makes preparing for the school exciting.

3. **Talk to your child about their feelings** about school, friends, teachers, and new activities. When discussing back-to-school, you might gauge your child's thoughts about the classroom. Ask them what they are looking forward to and what they are interested in learning, along with any concerns they might have.

4. **Set intentions with your child** for the school year ahead. Just like adults make intentions for the new year, students can do the same for the new school year. You could choose a new “focus word” (e.g. friendships) with your child every month.

FOOD BASKETS FOR THE NEEDY

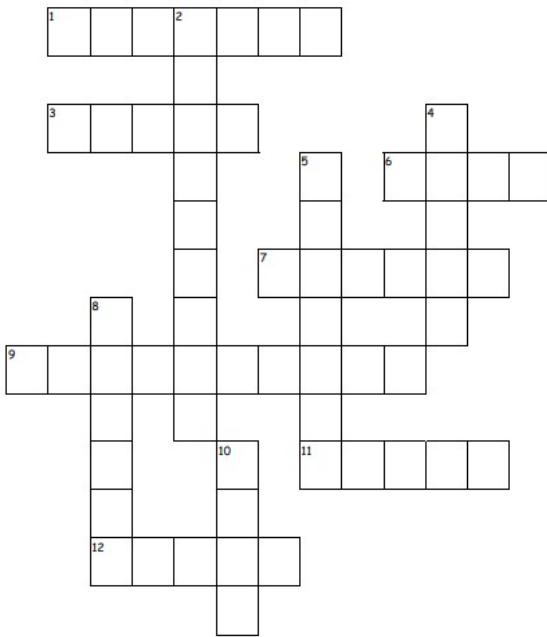

REFLECTION BY DIANNE BERGANT CSA

The readings that are offered to us as we begin Ordinary Time carry over some of the themes that we considered during the Christmas season. Then we celebrated the new era that God inaugurated through the birth of Jesus. Now we look deeply into our minds and hearts to see just how open we are to the demands of that new year. Last Sunday we considered the manifestation of the Spirit at the time of the baptism of Jesus. This Sunday we contemplate the various manifestations of that same Spirit in our own lives. Finally, we are brought to realise that this variety of Spirit-filled ministries is intended to be a source of Christian unity and not of fragmentation or division.

One of the major themes gleaned from the readings for today is that of the call to newness. God summons us to something new, gives us a new name, provides us with new experiences, launches us into new ministries, and calls us to sing a new song of praise. Even Jesus experienced a call to newness. Through Mary, God called him out into ministry, a ministry that would bring the fruits of the eschatological age of fulfilment to the whole world. We may be inclined to think of Pentecost as the season of the Spirit, but in reality the newness of God always comes to us through the Spirit regardless of the season of the year. In the world of the new age, the real glory of Jesus will be manifested in the variety of the gifts of the Spirit given to the church.

Amongst other things, she served as President of Catholic Biblical Association of America (2000-2001) and has been awarded honorary doctorates from several other universities. She was an active member of the Chicago Catholic/Jewish Scholars Dialogue (1988-2017).
