

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

In today's gospel passage, it is the devout Simeon and the prophetess, Anna, who declare the greatness and far-reaching influence of the child that has been brought to the Temple. This is a common feature of the gospel accounts. It is not Jesus himself who proclaims his greatness but those who have observed him and recognised the revelation of God's presence amongst the people. It is a role that continues today. Those of us who believe and recognise the presence and influence of God in the world are challenged to proclaim it in both our actions and our words.

those that share our Sundays from other Catholic Rites we add another strength of common practice and language, as they do in their churches. The signs, symbols and rituals unite us. We should be reluctant to do our own thing or let our own personal devotions take over our public prayer.

Our personal devotions are important. They aid our relationship with God, hopefully leading us to a deeper understanding of the mission entrusted to us as members of the church and as an individual before God. They should aid too our relationship with Christ and our understanding of what that means for our salvation and the salvation of the world. Don't forget the mission has a church not the church has a mission. I like too that whilst I may have personal devotions you may have different ones and that is ok. Mine no more important than yours. There are thousands of devotions and ways to pray. The minute I think my way is better than yours I suspect I have lost sight of what I am on about.

I feel a great deal of joy knowing that if our records went back to the Disciples themselves, we could trace in an unbroken line through baptism back to them. I know who baptised me, he knows who baptised him etc. Same with ordination and confirmation. It is a strength in our belonging. What we have is over two thousand years of faith, worship and sharing God's love in Christ. Intrinsically linked, sometimes dented but always unbroken.

Let's celebrate our being together as we pray for each other.

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. To this end, your attention is drawn to **preparing each child for starting or resuming school**. Following tips 1-4, two weeks ago, here are tips 5-10.

5. Practise, practise, practise reading. Set up a 'book nook' at home to develop a reading routine for your child, or for you and your child.

6. Read books about starting school. Stories with characters your child can relate to — especially those with characters attending their first day of kindergarten.

7. Include a note/drawing with your child's lunch box. This special touch to let your child know you're thinking about them.

8. Encourage your child to pursue a passion project this year. Ask what topic they really want to learn about in the school year ahead. Your child can research the topic to gain knowledge which can be shared during class.

9. Help your child develop independence skills. At home, focus on self-help skills and responsibility. Set up 'school day' check list and place it on your fridge.

10. Make school run drop off quick and painless. Find out the school 'drop-off' policy including car drop off areas and times.


FOOD BASKETS FOR THE NEEDY

Lk 2:22-32

Reflection by Richard Leonard

Jewish law stipulated that within forty days of a child's birth the parents should present their baby in the temple as an act of thanksgiving. In the Bible the number forty always indicates a time of formation. So forty days after Christmas the Church has today's celebration. As Luke describes the scene Simeon and Anna represent the Old Covenant. He embodies all those who longed to see the Christ. She embodies all those who prophesied his coming. In a few sentences Luke tells us that just as the Israelites entered the Promised Land after forty years in the desert, so now the time of waiting, searching and hoping is over. Israel can receive the promised Messiah.

The word 'presentation' is used in two revealing ways these days. In psychology they talk about a 'presenting problem'. In medicine people are said to 'present' with certain symptoms. In both cases, the word presentation is used to indicate that something more important lies beneath what is first observed. Further investigation reveals the deeper causes and the best course of action.

So to us. We present ourselves in the temple today and it's important we remember that we do have to put on a show for God. God does not need a performance from us; God invites us to an encounter of love. Seeing that God knows us intimately it's crazy that we should be anything but ourselves before him. But we sometimes go through the pretence of dressing things up, pretending otherwise or putting on a show.

Today's feast reminds us that when we encounter the presence of God a range of responses are on display. Just recall the ones in today's Gospel: expectation, hope, frailty, thanksgiving, foreboding, puzzlement, love and joy.

May Jesus' presentation enable us to let pass in peace any need to act before God, but rather embrace a new way of encountering God's presence, where we own just how we are, and not how we would like to be. When we do this we can enjoy the possibilities of a rich, deep and realistic relationship with God. We also find that it's so much easier to discover, with God, the causes and the actions that will lead us to healing, fulfilment and peace.
