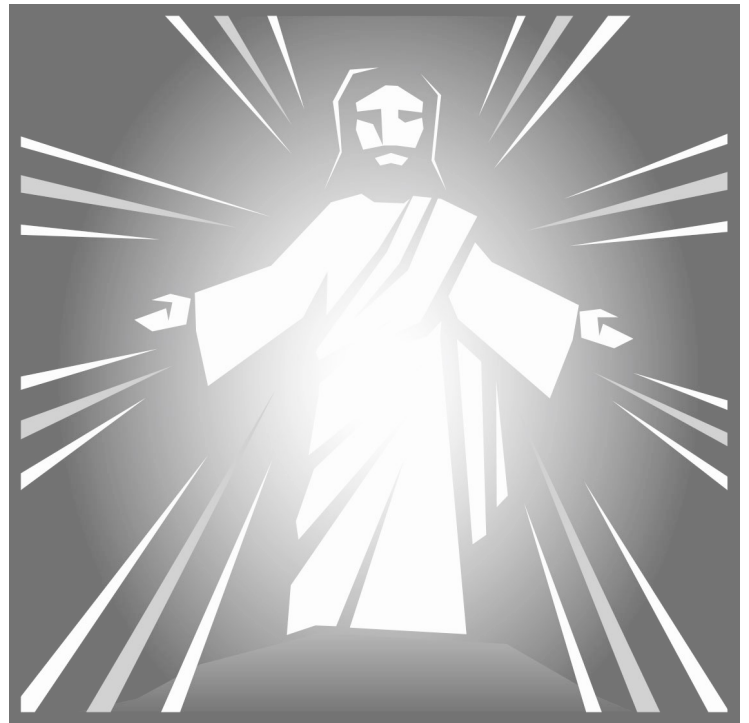

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

We have begun in earnestness the preparation for the Easter Triduum. Not all the Mass times exactly decided, or the places sorted. Over the next few days and weeks, you will be given many opportunities to be involved, however. By leading parts or by participating with responses. There is a truth about an experience being heightened when we participate. I equate it to every event religious or civil; we come either as spectators or witnesses. Spectators always sit on the sideline whilst a witness is always involved. I don't think Christians can ever be spectators.



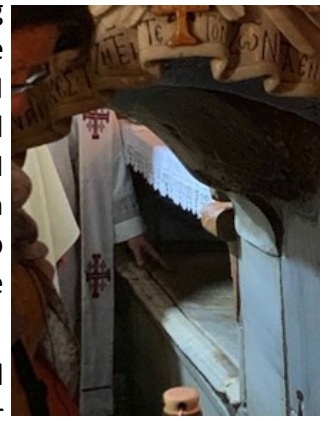
Witnessing is not passive even when our part has less up front involvement. As witnesses you are invited to the journey and to experience all the sights, sounds and smells of Easter. So much to be part of with the washing of feet, veneration of the cross, the Easter fire, the singing, the readings, ushering, etc. Over the next days sign up sheets will be available for those wishing to take a part through some of those roles and assist all of us in our experience of the Easter journey and season. The more we have to participate, the more it becomes an experience for all of us.

If you read a piece of scripture and then close your eyes imaging what it must have been like as the story retells it something of the scripture becomes more alive and the experience and the invitation takes on flesh in ways simply reading the words can not convey. As you think about what your part might be this Easter begin by taking a walk through the scriptures, close your eyes and let your heart and imagination take you there to that time and place. Think about what you see, hear, smell, even feel.

I have had an opportunity to be in the Holy Land, to walk in the dust of the roads that Jesus himself would have walked. Two experiences come to mind this time of the year particularly from my time there. Sitting in the garden of Gethsemane with my shoes and socks off, eyes closed feeling the soil of the garden between my toes and wondering, imaging what it must have been like for Jesus in the garden. You can recapture that in your own garden with your feet in the bare and dry earth. I also felt the sharp edges of the thorns on a tree that grows nearby. Maybe the photo shows the size of the thorns used for His crown. Razor sharp.



The second was concelebrating Mass in Jesus' tomb in the heart of the Holy Sepulchre. I close my eyes even now and can feel what that was like. I have this picture of myself in the tomb; I found it hard to take my hand off the place where He lay.



In getting ready home and heart for the Easter ceremonies take some time to just be in the moment with Jesus; read, pray, reflect, be still.

JUBILEE PILGRIMAGE

St Benedict's Inner Newcastle Parish has two sites in the suggested local pilgrimage sites: Sacred Heart Cathedral, Newcastle West, and St Mary's, Newcastle.

Pilgrimage to Sacred Heart Cathedral

While the Cathedral is open to all every day of the year, we have added a special opportunity for prayer during the Jubilee Year. Join us for Vespers at 5pm on the first Thursday of each month, concluding in November: April 3, May 1, June 5, July 3, August 7, September 4, October 2, November 6.

Vespers (also called Evening Prayer) is part of the Liturgy of the Hours, also known as the Divine Office.

The Liturgy of the Hours includes several specified times of prayer. The most important times, called the "hinge hours," are Morning Prayer (which takes place upon rising) and Evening Prayer (which takes place as dusk begins to fall).

Evening Prayer gives thanks for the day just past and makes an evening sacrifice of praise to God. The structure of Evening Prayer is as follows:

Introductory Verse, Hymn, Psalmody - singing or reciting two and a canticle (or hymn)

Scripture Reading, Responsory, Gospel Canticle, Intercessions, Lord's Prayer, Concluding Prayer, Dismissal

Pilgrimage to St Mary's, Newcastle

Join us at St Mary's, Newcastle each Saturday in May (the month of Mary) between 11am and noon to spend a gentle hour in prayer and reflection on Our Lady.

May is considered the "Month of Mary." This time offers a lovely opportunity to explore her role and significance in our Catholic tradition and how her life and virtues continue to inspire followers of her son, Jesus.

Each Saturday morning in May, we will reflect on Mary. Her example of humility, obedience, and unwavering faith makes her a central figure in worship and a guiding light in the lives of many around the world. FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. This week, your attention is drawn to **worldwide barriers to child protection**.

Barriers can be legal, social, economic, or institutional, making it difficult to safeguard children from abuse, neglect, and exploitation.

One major barrier is **lack of awareness** among communities and caregivers **about children's rights and protection measures**. In some cultures, harmful traditional practices, such as child marriage or corporal punishment, are normalised, making intervention challenging.

Weak legal frameworks and enforcement also hinder child protection. Laws may be inadequate, poorly implemented, or not strictly enforced due to corruption or lack of resources. Additionally, limited access to child protection services, such as social workers, shelters, and counselling, leaves children vulnerable.

Poverty and economic hardship force some families to engage in child labour or trafficking, while children in conflict zones or displaced communities face higher risks of exploitation.

Another challenge is **stigma and fear**, which prevent children from reporting abuse due to fear of retaliation or societal judgment.

Finally, **lack of coordination among agencies**, including law enforcement, healthcare, and child welfare organizations, weakens protection efforts.

Before being too critical of other countries, we need to check our own back yard.

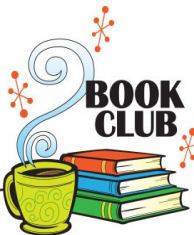

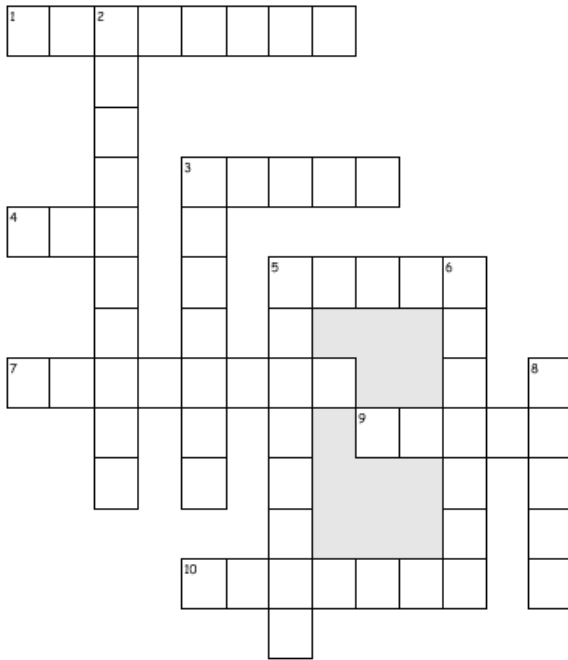

REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

The Transfiguration is no mountaintop light show. In borrowing heavily from similar stories in the Old Testament, it describes, in a dramatic way, how loved Jesus was by God and how this experience was seen and known by his disciples.

So often we hear people say they have not, or cannot, experience the presence of God, and therefore deny that God exists. These readings show us that if you want to encounter God then you have to experience love. This is not an optional extra for the Christian life. As St John says, 'The one who says they love God, yet they hate their brother or sister, is a liar.'

The Transfiguration is not a once off event for Jesus alone. It is a moveable feast for all of us who have become God's sons and daughters in Christ.

The problem with love is that we have devalued the currency. We say it too often about things we don't or can't love, like our car, a bottle of wine or our holiday. We say 'I love you' to people we don't love and because we have learnt that actions are more telling than words we don't easily believe others when they tell us they love us.

We can feel unlovable and cynical about the whole experience. But there are three things of which we can be sure: If we feel distant from God, we only have to guess who has moved away from whom. Nothing we do stops God from loving us.

God loves us as we are, not as we like to be. As the old saying goes, 'you don't have to get good to get God. You have to get God to get good.'

Finally, as the song runs, 'You ain't nobody until somebody loves you.'

And so for a Christian, being vulnerable enough to tell those we love that we love them is no sentimental exercise but a participation in the heart of God. By taking the risk of doing this, others may clearly hear the voice of God through us and we may discover ourselves transfigured by the personal love of God for us too.

In the process God may move from being an idea, an abstraction, even an object of curiosity to the focus of a loving experience that can give our lives meaning, purpose and hope.

In this Eucharist then, let's ascend the mountaintop and let's listen to Jesus say, 'You are my son. You are my daughter. And I love you.'
