

GOSPEL FOCUS - REPENT

Throughout the gospels, Jesus challenged the prevailing 'purity codes' that separated and classified people. The Jewish religious officials of the day were obsessed with the 'letter of the Law' as it applied to purity observance. Jesus told them that a spirit of compassion was much more important than the blind adherence to the Law. He suggests that it is not the lack of observance of purity codes that makes a person 'unclean' or 'sinful'; rather, it is lack of compassion informing their actions towards others. The call to 'repent' is a call to complete conversion of heart – to take on an attitude of compassion.

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

Ask a dozen different people what it means to be Catholic, and I suspect you will get a dozen different answers, most of which together will come close to defining Catholicity. Maybe putting them all together



would give us the rich definition we all long for and the world needs to hear. Most of us I suspect will define it in terms of practising, which we also define as coming to church. Hopefully coming to Church and living our lives witnessing to the Good News. Ask many of our young Catholics though and whilst there will be an element of some of our thinking, being in church maybe, most of them I think will fall more closely to what we older Catholics would term 'works of the church. Their thinking more closely aligned or embedded in our Social Justice teachings and practice.

Many of our younger Catholics may not necessarily factor in coming to Church but would still call themselves, if they think deeply about it, Catholic. I suggested to one good young person recently that being Catholic and indeed Christian might include connecting to the worshipping community e.g. on Sunday. Not much 'rolling of eyes' thankfully but a gentle reminder back to me of something I used in a homily recently: 'standing in a garage doesn't make you a car', followed by 'I often park my car in the street Father.' Any suggestion that he was less Catholic was insulting.

I wish lots of others in our community could have the maturity and wisdom of our faith and feel and know the 'food and nourishment' we get from being together on Sunday. Hearing the Word and being fed at the Table is something that we wouldn't think about going without. Indeed, we would feel bereft not to have this encounter together. It is more than guilt when we miss Mass, it's a deeper yearning than that. Our Catholic life calls on us to be persevering, resilient and faithful to the teachings of Christ and to the community in which we belong. Everything we do should have something of the invitation we have received and answered for others.

I was trying to define what it means to be Catholic once in a homily. One member of the congregation felt I had missed an opportunity to remind the faithful of a few basic precepts of Catholicity, five basic precepts. In some ways these define what it means to be practising, maybe even Catholic. You might be surprised at a couple of them. **1.** attending Mass on

Sundays and holy days of obligation, with a couple of exceptions (if you are sick for example). **2.** Confessing sins at least once a year. **3.** Receiving the Eucharist at least during Easter, or at least once a year. **4.** Observing days of fasting and abstinence, with a couple of exceptions. There are many ways to observe the discipline of fasting without not eating. **5.** Every Catholic is obliged to help provide for the Church's needs – that means resources which might include money, might include acts of charity and generosity and those good works my young friend was involved in.

Here's a question: how do you define being Catholic or what is your definition? The answer informs our Christian Catholic life. In short, what we say we should do. Blessed third Sunday of Lent – keep up the good works.

FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. This week, your attention is drawn to online fraud targeting the elderly.

Online fraud of seniors is an ongoing concern, as scammers exploit their trust and limited familiarity with technology. These fraudulent activities often involve deception, where criminals pose as legitimate institutions such as banks, government agencies, or even family members. The goal is to steal personal information, money, or both. Common tactics include the emails looking legitimate to trick you into falling for the scam, fraudulent phone calls, fake online ads, and fraudulent online shopping scams.

Elderly victims might receive emails or phone calls claiming they've won a prize, need to make urgent payments including fines, or must provide personal information to prevent identity theft. These scams prey on the emotional vulnerability of seniors, often leading them to act quickly without questioning the authenticity of the situation.

It is vital to educate older adults about the risks of online fraud. Awareness, scepticism, security measures like strong passwords and two-factor authentication can help protect seniors from falling victim to scams. Additionally, family members should regularly offer guidance on safe internet practices.



COMMENTARY BY MARY COLOE PBVM

The Lenten theme of repentance (metanoia) is the central teaching of today's Gospel. As Jesus moves towards Jerusalem, he speaks with a sense of great urgency to the crowds who come to him. Time is short. Jesus gives the crowd two very graphic images of disasters: the first is of Pilate slaughtering some Galileans while they were offering their sacrifices, and the second is a tower near the pool of Siloam that suddenly collapsed. Jesus' message to the crowd is, 'Don't think this couldn't happen to you.' There was a tendency to see the hand of God behind such sudden, apparently haphazard disasters, and so to think that those caught up in these events were being punished for sin. In this way some could be thinking, 'This couldn't happen to me. They deserved it.' Jesus warns against such complacency. The parable of the fig tree reiterates this teaching. Time is running out. Today is the moment of choice.

The 'time is short' message is not meant to frighten us with thoughts of death, but to urge us to live authentically. Live fully. Live each moment purposefully. Are we people who choose life, or does life just happen to us?

Jesus often taught using parables, such as the one in today's Gospel. The point of a parable is that some comparison is being made between the image in the story and the life of Jesus' listeners. Paul also uses comparisons as a teaching technique. Today, speaking to the community at Corinth he reminds them of the experience of the Israelites in the Exodus. They passed through the waters of the Sea, they were guided by the pillar of cloud; they were fed by the manna – and yet, in spite of all these signs of God's lavish care, they all died; so be warned.

Like the people in Jesus' time, and the Corinthians, living Christian faith does make demands that go beyond an hour on Sunday. In all the choices we make, about what we buy, how we live and how we vote, we are to be guided by Gospel principles of 'love of God and neighbour.' Are we living a rigorous Christianity that stands for principles of social justice, respect for all, tolerance towards others with a special regard for those most vulnerable in our society? What are our values really? How much do Gospel values impinge on the choices we make. These questions may help depth our Lenten time of *metanoia*.
