#### One with the lost

Throughout the Gospel of Luke, Jesus is portrayed as not only the champion of the poor and outcast, but indeed being one with them. The witnesses to his birth in this gospel are lowly shepherds, not the wise men from the East. His parables and actions are addressed to the lost and the lowly. He eats with sinners and other outcasts – to the horror of Jewish leaders. Finally, at his death, Jesus is crucified as a criminal with other criminals. This gospel in particular addresses the message and ministry of Jesus to those on the margins of society.

## FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

Palm Sunday! Where did Lent go! Holy Week begins and I know that there is still much to be done in readiness for the Easter Celebrations, not only in the Church. Every home is getting ready, religious or not. It is such an ironic turn of events, Easter. So many people will gather in Churches around our community and indeed world. However, many will also gather in homes without much thought to why, yet still marking as significant this important Christian time of the year. Easter Sunday is important to almost everyone, overtly religious or not, whether they fully own it as religious or not.



The palms that everyone will have had blessed today are symbolic of the journey that Jesus made into Jerusalem. As we sing Hosanna we should take some time to reflect on those moments in our own journey when we do sing hosanna acknowledging our King through our actions, also remembering like many who sang on that day some 2000 years ago we have times when we fall away and are not as faithful to the life and invitation to life that we profess. We must note that some who sang hosanna later sang crucify him. The palms are a symbol of both so I remind you to take good care of them, they are blessed, and we will ask for them back next year in readiness for Ash Wednesday. I find the best place to keep mine is to weave the palm through the arms of Jesus on my crucifix. I have a few crucifixes – almost every room has one – I like however to have the palm woven into the arms of the crucifix near my front door, to witness my good times and not so good, my comings and my goings.

As you get ready for Easter and finalise the last bit of shopping can you think about buying one egg that is just a chocolate shell. Many refer to them as hollow, however eggs are not hollow but rather empty. The difference in wording is important. Whilst we sometimes bemoan the commercial nature of the shopping at this time of the year and the hijacking of our days by money makers, not everything is lost to commercial values. Those eggs are symbolic of the empty tomb of Easter Sunday. The egg is a sign of fertility and so new life. When we crack the egg open on Easter Sunday and find it empty, we are reminded of Mary Magdalene arriving at Jesus' tomb and finding it empty.

Grandparents, parents, uncles and aunties make sure you give your loved ones at least one of these symbols

of the empty tomb. As you gather on Easter Sunday in your grace remind the family, and your friends why this day is important, giving thanks for the graces and blessings of that empty tomb for us and why you have given them the empty egg. I have been in the habit of breaking an egg, praying the grace and then inviting each person to take a piece, giving thanks. Jesus died and rose from the dead for all of us, believer and unbeliever, saint and sinner alike. Something worth reminding our loved ones about, I think. And if you want to be really brave – invite them to church with you as a special gift for Easter.

## HOLY LAND COLLECTION - GOOD FRIDAY APRIL 18TH 2025



The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, April 18th. This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment, housing, parishes, and orphanages. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus.

Due to the ongoing war, the Church and people of the Holy Land are still struggling with reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world. In 2024 Australian Catholics were once again extremely generous and we were able to send to the Holy Land nearly \$1.5 million (\$1.4 million [2023], \$1.4 million [2022] and \$1,126,098 [2021]).

The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges, financial and spiritual, and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday. Thank you.

Donation envelopes have been sent to all churches this weekend and can either be brought to the Good Friday ceremonies at the Cathedral or Stockton, or placed on the collection plate at any Mass over the next couple of weekends.

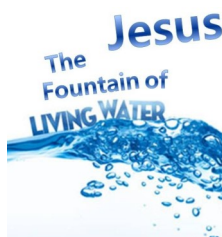

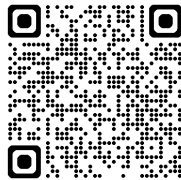
## MYANMAR EARTHQUAKE

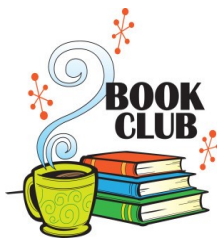

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## SAFEGUARDING NEWS

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of protection within our Parish. This week, your attention is drawn to upcoming **Diocesan Safeguarding Network meetings**.

2025 Network meetings are scheduled for Thursday 5th June and Wednesday 17th September. These meetings serve as a platform for sharing information, best practices, and addressing concerns related to safeguarding within the diocese.

People from each parish within the Diocese who are involved in safeguarding roles are invited, including parish priests, pastoral workers, designated safeguarding committees and leadership groups. Representatives from the Diocesan Office of Safeguarding (OoS) and relevant diocesan staff will also attend. Agenda items and location of these two meetings are under planning by staff at the OoS.

The OoS is changing the dissemination of its quarterly newsletters from the intranet to internet. Up to now, a private intranet network has been used for training and support of safeguarding staff and volunteers just within the OoS - this has now been largely achieved. With OoS newsletter articles becoming broader in content and more suitable for a wider target audience, distribution will be best achieved through the internet with its broad global access.

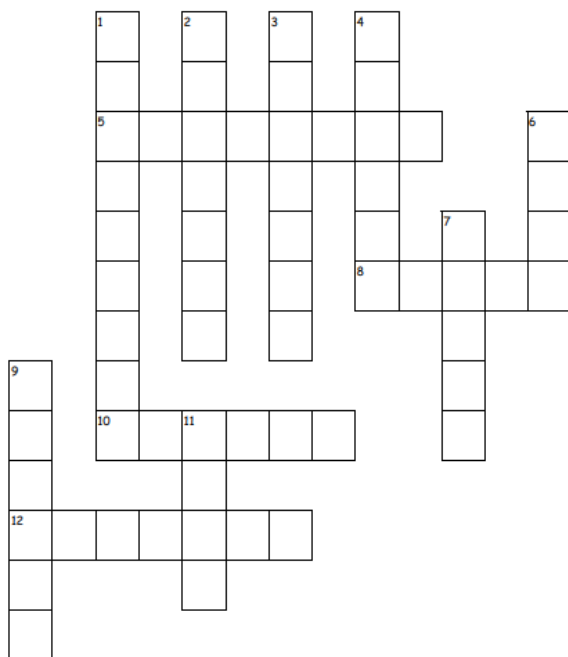

## REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

The crowd who cheered on Palm Sunday proved to be a fickle lot. It took them no time at all to move from the cries of adulation of Palm Sunday to the derision of Good Friday, and back again, with frightening speed. What is most worrying, however, is that we can do the same just as easily.

The reality is that Palm Sunday is not a yearly historical pageant. It is the day when we hear proclaimed that:

- our God knows what it's like to be heralded on Sunday and condemned on Friday;
- our God loved us so much that he laid down his own life so that we might live;
- our God showed us that the price of walking on palm branches is in the taking up of the cross.

And how do we do that? How do we face all the Calvaries of our world and be Christ-like?

In the Passion we are told that Jesus did five things:

- He healed the ear of the High Priest's servant;
- He spoke the truth to Pilate;
- He empathised with the women of Jerusalem;
- He forgave those who condemned him;
- He had compassion toward the other criminal being crucified.

And here's the rub: in facing our personal passion and being with those who face their Calvary we are called to do likewise.

If Holy Week means anything it means we end this week as we began it – processing. Walking away from inflicting pain to being a healer, desisting with lies and speaking the truth, resisting the temptation to judge and embracing empathy as our first response and, always and everywhere, being generous with forgiveness and compassion. No more and no less is asked of us if we are to follow 'the King of Love on Calvary'.
