FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

During my time in the Defence Force, like many serving members, I was deployed overseas. In 2004 I deployed to the Middle East and spent time flying a circuit across three countries which included Iraq. It was a difficult time for many who were deployed and placed a huge pressure on their families here, back home in Australia. Chaplaincy plays an important part in the spiritual, emotional and physical wellbeing of individuals and their families.



One of the privileges of that experience was an opportunity to lead the ANZAC service standing on desert sands in the Middle East and during a military conflict. It made the ANZAC day 'experience' for me more real and brought home to my heart the sacrifice of those young men and women who served in the conflicts our great nation has been part of. All of them paid a huge price for our ongoing freedom. Some paid the ultimate sacrifice and gave their lives, some brought home memories never to be forgotten, all were changed for ever in ways that they could not have imagined as they boarded planes, trains and boats. We know more today about the toll critical incidents and events like war play on our mental health and the burden that they carry throughout life as a result. So much has been experienced and written post war about that impact.

The families of serving men and women pay a price too. Young men and women went away for years during our past wars. They grew older. Life here in Australia was affected by their sacrifice. Nothing would be the same. Families lost beloved members of their families, husbands, wives, sons and daughters. Their bodies lie in foreign lands. Some lost their loved ones to illnesses they came home with or developed later, and still many more suffered because of the impact on their loved ones' experiences. They all paid a price.

Almost every family here in Australia is touched, none spared. It doesn't matter where you are from, something of the wars and conflicts affects you and your family. We are a nation bonded by a lived reality in this space. Few nations have been spared in the last century from war and defending those in need.

ANZAC day is such a powerful day in the psyche of Australia; it says much about what we say of ourselves as a nation. I hope that you were able to attend a service or two in honour of the sacrifice paid for peace. That you spent a moment in prayer remembering the fallen and their families. I hope you

were able to also pray in gratitude for so much of what we have here and for our desire to live in peace with our brothers and sisters, neighbours and friends. Easter is about the sacrifice of the One for the salvation of many. No coincidence maybe that ANZAC day falls so close this year to Divine Mercy Sunday.





REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

The earliest Christian community focused strongly on the wounds of the Risen Lord for two reasons: to affirm the fact that Christ, now raised from the dead was the same person who had lived with them; and also to make sense of the physical wounds being inflicted on them for Christ's sake.

The story of Thomas, even with its mystical details, counters a magical notion of what the resurrection is about. Jesus bears the marks of his torture and death. His glorified body, though different, is connected to how the disciples knew and loved him. They can recognise him through his words and his wounds.

We know the community of Ephesus, for which this Gospel is written, was experiencing great persecution. Is it any wonder, one generation from the earliest disciples, that the sign of Christ's risen presence are *his* marks of suffering?

We carry within us the death of the Lord. We all have our wounds. And we also know that, for many of us, it is precisely when we are wounded most deeply by life, that our doubts in the presence of God are greatest.

The Easter story is not that we should be ashamed of this, or pretend it doesn't happen. Today's Gospel reminds us that it is into this chaos that Christ comes with words of peace, with empathy from the one who was wounded for our sake and with the mission to forgive as we are forgiven.



To the People of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It is with great sorrow we receive the news of the death of Pope Francis.

As a Church, we mourn the loss of our chief shepherd and universal pastor. Pope Francis led with compassion and humility. He will be remembered for his unshakable faith in God's mercy, his invitation to us all to live the joy of the Gospel, and his strong commitment to justice, particularly when it came to advocating for the poor and calling on us to be a Church of mercy. He was a true testament to living the Gospel.

Throughout his papacy, Pope Francis encouraged us all to act in faith. He was passionate about calling the world to care for the marginalised, to protect our common home, and to build a Church that reaches outward rather than turning inward. He lived by example; teaching us to truly know Christ, we must connect with and care for one another. He lived this mission and was a leader who valued dialogue over division and love over fear.

While we grieve, I encourage everyone to reflect on his leadership and think about the ways in which we can imitate him in our own lives. Each of us has a role in carrying on his vision of a Church that welcomes, serves and proclaims the joy of the Gospel.

I was fortunate to meet Pope Francis in 2019 when in Rome with the Australian bishops for our Ad Limina visit. For over an hour he spoke informally with us and spontaneously responded to our questions. His joy and humility shone through, as did his love for Jesus Christ, the Church, and for all of humanity and creation.

We take consolation that his death occurs as we are celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. As he said to us in his Bull of Indiction for the Jubilee year: "The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope ... Christian hope consists precisely in this: that in facing death, which appears to be the end of everything, we have the certainty that, thanks to the grace of Christ imparted to us in baptism, "life is changed, not ended."

Throughout my lifetime I have observed the Holy Spirit continually guide our cardinals to choose the right Pope for the right time. We give thanks to God for the life and papacy of Pope Francis and pray for the eternal rest of his soul. I also encourage you all to keep our global Catholic community in your hearts and prayers during this time of transition, as well as the Cardinals who will soon gather to elect his successor.

The Diocese will gather for a Memorial Mass at Sacred Heart Cathedral at 6:30pm on Monday, 28 April, to celebrate and mourn in prayer. Further details will be available later today on the Diocesan website.
