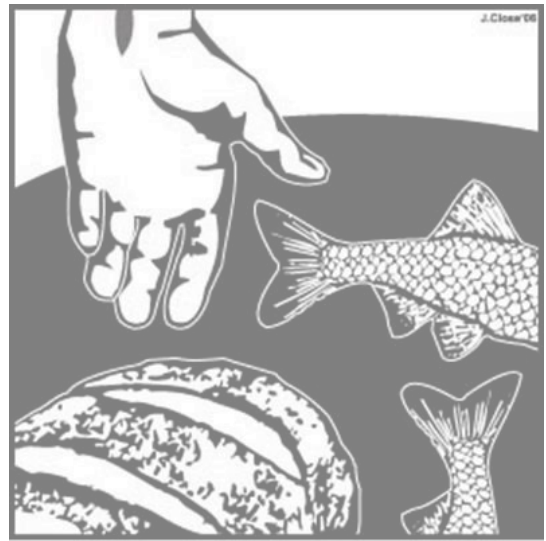

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

I'm not sure what is getting the most airplay on tv and social media – *Pope Francis and the upcoming Conclave* or the *federal election*. It is impressive getting so much positive 'advertising' for our church. For the community to be excited about the process for choosing a new catholic leader and its outcome gives me some genuine hope for the future. I have had many opportunities to talk about it and why it is important to me and to us – people are genuinely caught up in it. Last week we gave you a prayer card to take home so that together we could pray for the Holy Spirit to guide the deliberations. It was timely, the release of the movie 'Conclave'. Whilst the ending is 'unexpected' it has given insight and probably more interest in the happenings in Rome. It is a movie and there is some, maybe a lot of, fiction in the dialogue and intrigue, however parts are what happens.



It is a hard decision they make and the ramifications for their choice huge. There is of course an impact for our catholic communities, but for the man they choose life will never be the same. How hard it must be to have the humility to say yes. Whilst I'm sure it would be flattering to be asked, each candidate in that chapel has to be aware of just how much is involved for them personally and what sacrifices they will be asked to make, demanded maybe to make.

It was moving to see Pope Francis' last days and where his mind and heart were focussed. Something powerful to know that his last acts were focused on others: wishing us a blessed Easter and gratitude for the nurse and staff who aided him. You might remember when he first walked out onto the balcony after his election and the words he used, 'pray for me'. What an invitation to share in the mission and ministry of his life and an insight into his understanding of the challenges ahead of him in his papacy.

If you get a chance to source a copy, watch a movie with those words 'Pray For Me' as its title. It is based on the life of Pope Francis, and it gives such insight into his heart and his motivation, his devotion to Our Lady and his commitment to the marginalised and isolated. Worth the effort to source it. It is based on his writings, his words and interviews with key people in his life. Would still be available somewhere on 'Youtube' if nowhere else.

On Thursday night (1 May) I met with the foundation members of our Baptism Team. Thanks to Amy, Rosa,

Jeannine, and Sara for contemplating the invitation but also heading out into what was not a great night weather wise. There is room for more on the team. Like all teams maybe not for everyone, however it is a privileged ministry to walk the journey with families to baptism and beyond. Hearing a family's story and why they are choosing to have their child baptised is humbling to say the least and to be part of it wonderful. Our baptism team is from different ages and stages of life; age is not a barrier to membership. Let me know if you think this could be for you.

Have a great week. Hope you voted well and that you continue to pray for the choosing of our Pope.

SAFEGUARDING

This week, you are reminded that **safeguarding encompasses a wide range of concerns where vulnerable people may experience harm or abuse, including:**

- **Physical Abuse** causing injury, by hitting, slapping, kicking, restraining, misuse of medication
- **Domestic or Sexual Abuse** encompasses violence, abuse or exploitation within a family or intimate relationship
- **Neglect** by failure to provide adequate care such as food, shelter, medical treatment or type of care wanted by the individual
- **Modern Slavery** involving force labour, human trafficking or domestic servitude
- **Psychological or Emotional Abuse** including bullying, threatening, humiliation, enforced social isolation
- **Financial or Material Abuse** by controlling & exploiting finances, theft, fraud, denying a person's access to their own assets
- **Discriminatory Abuse** based on race, gender, sexual orientation, pregnancy, religion, age, disability
- **Institutional Abuse** within schools / hospitals / care homes by providing run-down facilities, authoritarian management, lack of supervision, lack of respect for dignity or privacy, failure to respond to complaints.

Safeguarding is crucial to protect individuals from harm and to ensure their safety and well-being. It involves identifying potential risks, responding to concerns appropriately, and promoting a culture of respect and safety.

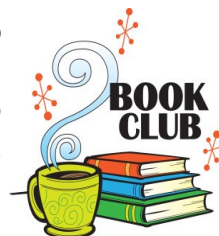

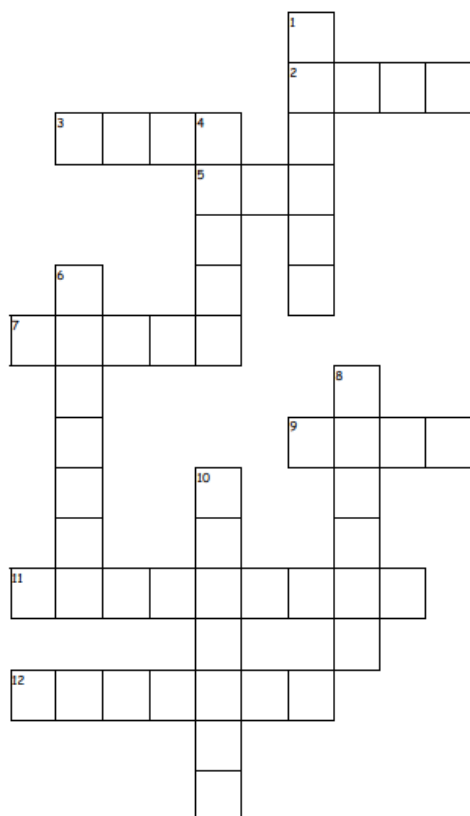

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WHAT HAPPENS IN A CONCLAVE?

The conclave to elect a new pope, scheduled to begin May 7, is governed by a rule book and a prayer book.

The rule book is the apostolic constitution, *Universi Dominici Gregis* (*Shepherd of the Lord's Whole Flock*), which was issued by St John Paul II in 1996 and amended by Pope Benedict XVI in 2007 and again in 2013.

The prayer book is the *Ordo Rituum Conclavis* (*Rites of the Conclave*), which was approved by St John Paul II in 1998. It begins by noting that the election of a pope "is prepared for and takes place with liturgical actions and constant prayer".

The rites of the conclave begin with the public Mass "for the election of the Roman pontiff," which is set to be celebrated on May 7 at 10am local time in St Peter's Basilica. The cardinals then gather in the late afternoon in the Pauline Chapel of the Apostolic Palace and then process into the Sistine Chapel.

The cardinals will take an oath to "faithfully and scrupulously observe" the rules for electing a pope. They also promise to keep secret everything having to do with the election.

Archbishop Diego Ravelli, master of ceremonies, will

then say: "*Extra omnes*," ordering all those not directly involved in the conclave out of the Sistine Chapel.

The cardinals traditionally cast one ballot on the first evening. After that, two ballots can be cast each morning and two each afternoon until a candidate gains two-thirds of the votes. After a ballot where there has not been an outcome, the ballots are burned with a chemical additive that produces black smoke pouring from the Sistine Chapel chimney.

On the fourth day, if no one has been elected, the cardinals pause for extended prayer.

When someone reaches the two-thirds threshold – 89 votes if, as reported, 133 cardinals enter the conclave – he will be asked by the most senior ranking cardinal, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, "Do you accept your canonical election as supreme pontiff?"

The ballots, along with the cardinals' notes or running tallies of the votes, are burned with a chemical additive to produce white smoke and announce to the world that there has been a successful election.

Then the senior cardinal deacon, French Cardinal Dominique Mamberti, will go to the central balcony of St Peter's Basilica and declare to the public, "*Habemus papam*" ("We have a pope").

REFLECTION BY FR MICHAEL TATE

You and I, like Peter, are enabled by grace to repent of our betrayals of Our Lord, some major, most minor, and to claim: "Lord, you know that I love you."

But, this claim has to be evidenced by concrete action. In the case of Peter it was to feed and shepherd "my lambs, my sheep." What will manifest our professed love? In the words of Father Richard Rohr, it is *to love what God loves*.

Of course, we have to love our fellow human beings, but leaving it there would be inadequate. "For God so *loved the cosmos* as to give the Son." (Jn 3:16,17) So what must we do?

Recall, Our Lord says elsewhere, "You are the Salt of the Earth." You must preserve the Earth so that it does not decay and so that it is a suitable habitation for all the creatures, including us, for whom the Earth is a common home.

He went on: "You are the Light of the Cosmos." You are the enlightened mind and the enflamed heart of the whole cosmos, enabling it to understand its existence and to love God for it.

We could pause for a moment to reflect on the words of Pope Francis: "We, the women and men of the Church, we are in the middle of a love story and each of us is a link in this chain of love. And if we do not understand this, we have understood nothing of what the Church is."

HISTORICAL **CONTEXT**

Feed my sheep

When Jesus asks Peter, "Do you love me?" and Peter repeatedly assures Jesus that he does, Jesus instructs Peter to "Feed my sheep." This image of feeding sheep is used to describe the caring leadership Peter is to take over the other disciples and the other followers of Jesus. The image of a shepherd has carried through the years and finds expression in the stylised shepherd's crook (crosier) that is carried as a symbol of office by bishops. The people of the church are often referred to as the bishop's flock – further carrying on the image of a shepherd and his sheep.
